PARLIAMENT HILL

Mr. Barry Moore (Parliamentary Secretary to Minister of State (Small Businesses and Tourism)): Mr. Speaker, as a member of this House, I feel we have a special responsibility to help maintain Parliament Hill as the dominant feature of this city. The Parliament Buildings and the site as such are not only an important symbol to Canadians, they are also a symbol of Canada throughout the world.

Height controls have been maintained by agreement between the city of Ottawa and the federal government for at least 20 years. All capital cities of consequence maintain such height controls.

Increased building heights in the core of the capital city would adversely affect and compromise the Parliament Buildings as the country's most important symbol.

DOMINION TEXTILE INC.

Mrs. Coline Campbell (South West Nova): Mr. Speaker, yesterday Dominion Textile announced that it will be closing its plant in Yarmouth, Nova Scotia and moving its operation to Magog, Quebec.

This closure will cost the town some 330 jobs, in addition to the 70 jobs it lost this fall to its U.S. company. This is about one-third of the total textile jobs in all of Nova Scotia.

Textiles has been the largest employer in Yarmouth for over a century. It survived the great depression, but it will not survive this government's monetary and trade policies.

In its letter to me yesterday Dominion Textile stated in its attached press release:

—the competitive position of both the Magog and Yarmouth plants is negatively affected by low manufacturing volumes. The inevitable decision to consolidate the two operations favoured Magog because a significantly lower capital investment is required to meet the needs of our industrial products business.

I call upon this government to set up an immediate commission to study why the costs are significantly lower for capital investment in Quebec over the Atlantic provinces. Perhaps this would be a job for the Atlantic Canada Opportunities Agency to study why in Atlantic Canada investment costs are are higher and make us non-competitive.
