Several very distressing cases have been brought to notice during the past few days, and unless something happens very quickly it is feared that several children will go without a visit from Santa Claus.

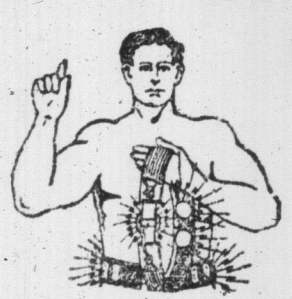

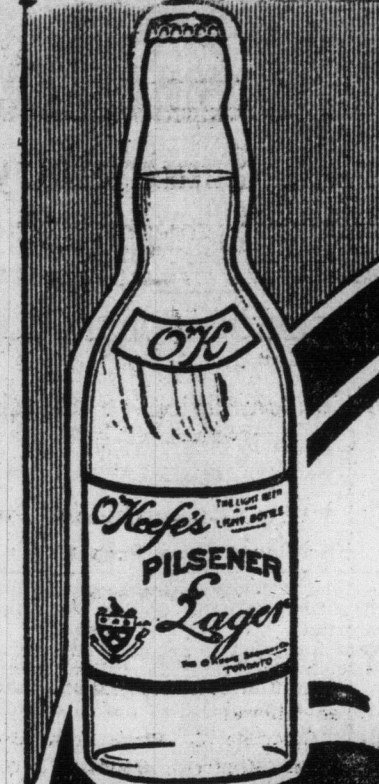

## Unique Ring Career Of Georges Carpentier

Georges Carpentier, who whipped Bombarde Wells for the heavyweight championship of Europe before the National Sporting Club in London, Eng., in the first round on Monday night, has a claim to distinction of a freak nature.

He is the only boxer on record who competed in every class of pugilism. Carpentier started his ring career as a bantam, but grew so rapidly that he was obliged to abandon the various divisions almost as soon as he entered them.

As a bantamweight, featherweight, lightweight and welterweight, he acquired those titles in France, where practically all of his work was done. As a welterweight his campaign was short-lived, and he was forced to enter the middleweight ranks.

In the class higher he won the championship of Europe, when he soundly whipped Jim Sullivan, then the titleholder in England, at Monte Carlo in two rounds. Previous to his meeting with Sullivan, Carpentier knocked the Englishman out in four rounds, but the Frenchman's victory was said to be in the nature of a fluke.

Carpentier's latest feat proved it wasn't, however, and establishes him the undisputed heavyweight champion of Europe and crowns a career as strange to the average ring follower as it is satisfying to Georges.

There have been many boxers who were forced to abandon one or two classes because of increasing weight, but records do not show when anybody save Carpentier competed legitimately in every division from bantam to heavy.

Carpentier's only defeat was at the hands of the light middleweight Billy Paake.
