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APPLICATION MADE BY C. P. R. FOR \$75,000,000 STOCK ISSUE PENDING NEARLY FOUR MONTHS

Finance Minister States That Sir Thomas Shaughnessy, Soon After Petitioning for Melon-Cutting Privilege Last August, Notified Government of the Additional \$60,000,000 Issue—Cochrane on G. T. P. Finances.

OTTAWA, Dec. 4.—(Special).—Some revelations in high finance came to the attention of the house today when Finance Minister White and Hon. Frank Cochrane, minister of railways, answered, at considerable length, enquiries of the ministry, proposed by W. F. Maclean, M.P. for South York, respecting the recent melon-cutting of the Canadian Pacific Railway Co. and the financial dealings between the government and the Grand Trunk Pacific Co.

The country will be started to learn that the Canadian Pacific Railway Co. petitioned the governor in council last August to permit an increase of its capital by sanctioning a proposed issue of the common stock of the par value of \$75,000,000.

While this application was pending Sir Thomas Shaughnessy announced to the government, verbally, that the company proposed to increase \$60,000,000 of common stock and to increase its capital by that amount in addition to the issue of \$75,000,000 for which the sanction of the government had been asked.

In his reply to Mr. Maclean today, the finance minister said the company had, on Oct. 2, 1912, increased its capital by authorizing a new issue of common stock of the par value of \$60,000,000. This was done apparently without prejudice to its application for leave to issue \$75,000,000 of the common stock, which application is still before the governor in council undisturbed.

On Aug. 13, 1912, Sir Thomas Shaughnessy wrote to the prime minister as follows: Montreal, Que., Aug. 13, 1912. Dear Sir.—The last issue of the company's stock on which the first subscriptions will be paid in the course of the next couple of months, exhausts the amount authorized by order in council, Aug. 17, 1908, for the ordinary purpose of the company, and


PETITIONED FOR ONE MELON WHILE BUSY CUTTING ANOTHER

Finance Minister Discloses That Sir Thomas Shaughnessy Applied for \$75,000,000 Issue in August and at Same Time Told of Forthcoming \$60,000,000 Distribution—Hon. Frank Cochrane Answers Questions on Government's Relations With the G. T. P.

Light on the federal government's relation to C. P. R. and G. T. P. financing is given in the replies by Hon. W. T. White, finance minister, and Hon. Frank Cochrane, minister of railways, to queries by the South York member. Hon. Mr. White said: In August last the C. P. R. petitioned the governor-in-council for permission to increase the capital stock by \$75,000,000.

Hon. Mr. Cochrane stated that Jules Home had been appointed to represent the government on the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway directorate for the protection of the public interest, but no report had been made. That the G. T. P., which is a contractor in the construction of the National Transcontinental between Winnipeg and Moncton, N.B., has been paid \$25,454,000 for its work.

NO JINGOISM IN CANADA, SAYS WHITNEY

Imperialistic Sentiments Were Heard at Canada Club Banquet, Which Was Attended by Many Noted Canadians—Rt. Hon. W. Long and Hon. A. E. Sifton Spoke.

LONDON, Dec. 4.—(C.A.P.)—The speeches at tonight's Canada Club banquet were in a sense remarkable for what the speakers did not say. Not a single direct and open reference was made to the naval question, although, doubtless, the subject was uppermost in the minds of most present. McLean Brown presided, his immediate neighbors being Rt. Hon. Walter Long, Sir R. Perks, Hon. Dr. Pyne, Hon. M. Mackenzie, Hon. A. L. Sifton, Earl Stanhope, Sir James Whitney, Sir T. Whittaker and Hamar Greenwood, M.P. Hearty cheers rewarded McLean's endeavor to get off the stereotyped style in proposing the toast of the Dominion.

Hon. A. L. Sifton declared that he found the feeling formerly apparent in England that Canada would separate from the empire now entirely disappeared. Rt. Hon. Walter Long made no allusion to the political bearings of his recent journey to Canada, but expressed profound gratitude for the lavish hospitality shown him. Canadians were imperialists in the truest sense and determined to take full share of the burden and make certain that the history of the British Empire would be even more glorious in the future.

STRIKERS FINED FOR LAW-BREAKING

Three Were Mulcted \$100 Each for Pointing Gun—Others Fined for Lesser Offences.

PORCUPINE, Ont., Dec. 4.—(Special).—Four foreigners were given a hearing before Magistrate Torrance at Toronto today. Leo Mascetti, Alex. Mascetti and Tuzsi Resio were fined \$100 each for pointing guns on the station platform. Alex. Mascetti and Mike Coschuk were fined \$5 each for causing a disturbance and Leo Mascetti was fined an additional \$25 for assault. Lawyers Godfrey and Grover of Toronto were counsel for defendants, and A. G. Cright, Halsebury, acted for the prosecution.

POLICE FOR STRIKE DUTY

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., Dec. 4.—(Special).—Under Inspector Mains, 17 members of the provincial police stationed along the frontier, left today for Porcupine, where they have been ordered for strike duty. A sufficient force remains along the border to attend to the routine duties of the provincial police.

EAGERLY AWAIT NAVAL MEASURE

General Outlines Will Be Substantially as Forecasted But Details Are Food For Conjecture.

OTTAWA, Dec. 4.—(Special).—Her Royal Highness the Duchess of Connaught and the Princess Patricia will occupy seats on the floor of the house tomorrow when the prime minister introduces his bill entitled "An act to authorize measures for increasing the effective naval forces of the empire." Keen and universal interest will attend the introduction of the bill and the delivery of Mr. Borden's speech after the Christmas recess. Mr. Borden will be followed by Sir Wilfrid Laurier who it is said, will speak briefly, and it is probable any prolonged debate will be postponed until the second reading.

TURKEY STILL FIGHTS GREECE

Armistice Only in Effect With Other Allies—No Provisions For Beleaguered Towns.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Dec. 4.—(Can. Press).—An official note issued this evening says: "An armistice has been concluded with Bulgaria, Serbia and Montenegro. The state of war with Greece continues." Although the complete terms of the protocol have not been made public, it is learned that the question of revictualing the beleaguered towns was abandoned, the government being satisfied that the towns were sufficiently supplied with foodstuffs to last until the conclusion of peace.

PRESIDENT WILL SEE BOTH SIDES

Principal Hagarty and Varajty Editors to Tell Their Stories to Dr. Falconer.

The capt of Toronto University heard evidence on the Harbor trouble for another two hours yesterday afternoon, and then adjourned indefinitely. But the difficulties existing between the student body and Principal Hagarty are not yet nearly settled. The World learned last night from reliable authority that President Falconer has arranged interviews with the head of Harbor Collegiate and the editors of Varsity, Stevenson and Pedley. He will meet these parties separately, hear their sides of the story and probably endeavor to effect a conciliation. At any rate he will make a formal report to the caput after conducting his personal investigation. The president will be out of town today, so it is not likely that he will be ready to summon the undergraduates of parliament before the beginning of next week.

CHURCHES MAY SOON FEDERATE

Presbyterians, Methodists and Congregationalists Meet in January to Draft Federation Scheme.

Canadian Presbyterians, Methodists and Congregationalists may federate during the year 1913. Great efforts are being made by the leaders to bring it into immediate operation. Early in January, the Presbyterians, Methodists and Congregationalists will meet in joint committee to draft the federation scheme in place of the church union proposed, which failed to secure sufficient Presbyterian support.

FATALLY HURT WHILE AT PLAY

Seven-Year-Old Boy Was Run Over by Freight Train While "Hooking" a Ride.

An attempt on the part of Albert Bone, aged seven years, to "hook" a ride on a train yesterday at Gerrard street and Jones avenue resulted in the little fellow being so seriously injured that he died in the General Hospital three hours after the accident. The lad's thigh was completely severed from the body, and he did not have a chance of recovery. Albert, who lived with his parents at 4 Blake street, had been in the habit of riding on the sides of freight cars. Yesterday afternoon at 3.40 he was noticed playing about the tracks. The freight train came along and the boy ran alongside until he was opposite one of the iron grips. He caught this, held on for a second, but his arms were not strong enough to bear the weight of his body. All the time the speed of the train was increasing. Unable to hang to the iron young Bone dropped. His right leg passed under the wheels and before the train could be stopped the wheels had passed over part of his body. Constable Adamson (442) rendered first aid. Dr. O'Hara was soon on the scene, and a passing motor car conveyed him to the hospital before the police ambulance arrived.
