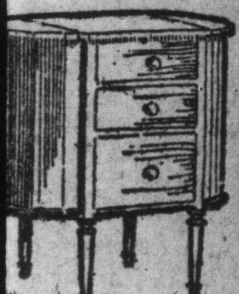

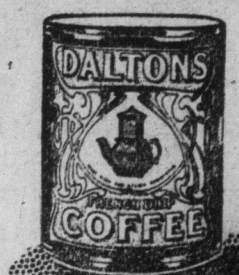

## WESTERN CANADA RAILWAY RATES

More Newspaper Support For  
W. F. Maclean's Position  
in Parliament—Must  
Give Relief.

We Build the Roads.  
News (Liberal), Medicine Hat, Dec. 6: The member for South York in the house, in his speech on the address from the throne, certainly put up a good case for the west, in the matter of railway freight and passenger rates, as well as in express and telegraph matters. It is refreshing to find a Conservative member from the east who will admit that the west has paid as much as the east for the railroads built in this western country.

Mr. Maclean is right in claiming that there should be no territorial discrimination in freight rates. The people of the west should not be compelled to pay higher rates than the people of the east. As he pointed out, it is a case of the east building the railroads here than it did in the east and moreover, the railways have so much business to do in the west that they cannot handle it. It is surely absurd, therefore, to claim that they do not get enough business to warrant them reducing their freight rates. The business of the west is mostly long haul business, which is considered the more profitable by railroads.

Maclean is right in his contention. There have been the contentions of the people of the west for years, and if he can in any measure prevail upon the other members of his party to remedy the state of affairs which at present militates against the prosperity of the west, the people of this part of Canada will at least partly forgive him for his contention to reciprocity.

Amend the Railway Act.  
Sun, Vancouver, Dec. 4: Mr. Maclean has for years been steadily advocating the reduction of passenger rates, on Canadian railways, to two cents per mile, and the abolition of territorial or differences in regard to rates. That public opinion is strongly with Mr. Maclean, and has been so from the first, is beyond question. The trouble is that Mr. Maclean has not been able to interest politicians in his movement, and the people at large have been too busy to give the support that was necessary, or were too doubtful of any result to be expected from such a demand, when he came to the stock to his own resolution which has secured wide approval, and it may be that eventually his persistence will achieve results.

The demand for the Canadian west for a red cut in freight rates will lend Mr. Maclean powerful support in his general policy for a measure of control by government and the people over the rates of the transportation companies. In the house of commons, on Monday, Maclean, in a speech on the address, made a stirring appeal for favorable consideration by parliament of western demands for the strongly advocated action by parliament rather than by railway companies in regard to reductions, creation of mergers and stock-watering.

Undoubtedly the member for South York is cursing the right of urging that parliament should amend the Railway Act by granting and clearly defining the most important reforms which are asked for. Such legislative action would simplify matters for the railway commission and would impress the public with a feeling of confidence in the federal authorities which are certainly lacking at the present time.

When we consider that decisions by the railway commission can be appealed to the governor-general in council as the court of last resort it is confidence in the government and in its determination to do what is right, we can never feel absolutely sure that a just judgment by the railway commission will be carried into effect.

In their own interests the members of the administration should display a willingness to accept Mr. Maclean's suggestion, as, in the long run, it would make matters much easier for themselves. The government already suffers under the aspersions of being over-ruled and controlled by the railway corporations, and it is not to be expected, at least, remove that stigma by legislation which would greatly strengthen on the hand of the commission and make it a useful labor on the part of the railway corporations to carry appeals from that board's decisions.

Didn't Help Pact  
Bryce Reiterates

Was Merely a Diplomatic Letter Carrier, He Says, at Peace Banquet—Canada Not Unfriendly.

NEW YORK, Dec. 13.—(Can. Press).—James Bryce, the British ambassador, told the committee for the celebration of the centenary of the signing of the peace treaty at a dinner tonight that nearly all were had been due to human folly or human passion, and dwell on how much better it was to celebrate the wisdom which had ended a war, and avoided any subsequent conflict, rather than the want of skill and wisdom which made wars possible.

The ambassador described what had been accomplished during his official stay in Washington to remove differences between the United States and Great Britain and to avoid differences in the future. Later, having in mind the recently the criticism directed at him from certain quarters in England, that he had acquiesced in a reciprocal agreement between the United States and Canada that put the poor bargain that it was rejected by the Canadian people, the ambassador said: "You may perhaps expect me to say something about another agreement which was much discussed a year and a half ago, namely, that the reciprocal lowering of tariffs between the United States and Canada. With that matter, however, I had nothing whatever to do, except as a mere intermediary. I may say a letter carrier, between the two governments. The questions involved were strictly questions for the United States on one hand and for the Canadian Government on the other, in which my only duty was to transmit messages from the one government to the other with-
