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SAMARITAN CLUB **DOING GREAT WORK**

Annual Reports Show Help Given to Those Afflicted With Tuberculosis.

Exceptionally good reports were read at the annual meeting of the Samaritan Club held in the Gage Institute yesterday afternoon, Mrs. C. H. Wilson presiding, and a large number of members in attendance. One of the most interesting items of the program was the report of the visiting nurse, Miss Julia Stewart, who told of 2451 visits to tubercular homes and an attendance of 2673, of which 273 were children, at various clinics. In all 64 families had received assistance, 48 of the cases being new. The report also dealt with much information regarding the methods used in visiting homes and the care taken to keep the children from becoming infected, the statement being quoted that there was not one chance in a thousand for a child in a tubercular home.

The treasurer's report, read by Miss Burns, showed receipts, \$9495.36; expenditure, \$7573.42; balance on hand. \$921.94. The Valdai Rest Home, which will accommodate 16 persons, had entertained and given rest and recreation to 89 guests. The recent sale of children's clothing had proved very successful, netting the society \$2000. Miss Blackwell moved the adoption of the reports, and paid eloquent tribute to the work of the visiting nurse, Miss Stewart.

Arc deacon Cody spoke of the pleasure he had experienced in listening to the reports, from which he had learned of the great work being done in trying to combat tuberculosis. The speaker also referred to the efforts of Sir William Gage in the direction of the prevention of the discretion of the prevention of the discretion of the prevention of the discretion. rection of the prevention of the disease, his vision and hard work having done so much to stamp it out. The Samaritan Club he described as the result of specialized effort. The conservation of children was the conservation of the country's chief asset. right to have protection against bad surroundings, to be taught to play and to be given a good education. The speaker commended the work of preserving the fit and transforming the unfit among the children, and said there was motive to be found in the name of Samaritan.

Sir William Gage added his congratulations, and said that thru their new field secretary, Miss Winifred Wiseman, the work of the Samaritan Club would become widely known Dr. Powell said that systematized effort was necessary to make Canada safe for future generations. Dr. Doby also said a few words, emphasizing the care that ought to be taken in guarding children from adults affected with tuberculosis.


