Why Burlington Suffers.

The Town of Burlington, Ontario has had no passenger service from the Hamilton Electric Radial Railway Co. a month past. The company has declined to obey the order of the Dominion Railway Commission, and the mission has no power to compel bedience. The company is under federal jurisdiction, but the federal government does not enforce the federal

London, Jan. 8 .- Field Marshal Sir Douglas Haig, in his report on operations from the end of April until the end of hostilities, pays a high tribute to Marshal Foch, commander-in-chief of the allied armies. In concluding his report the field marshal wrote:
