Ald. Spence's committee on the business tax proposal met yesterday afternoon and had a discussion upon the relative merits of the personalty and business tax methods of raising revenue. The result of the deliberations was the following resolution, which was adopted: "That it be recommended to Council that the Assessment Department be requested to provide special columns in the assessment roll for 1898, in which shall be entered the annual rental of each parcel of property or premises, in which is carried on a trade, manufactory, occupation, business, arts, profession, or means of profit or livelihood; also the proportionate part of each separately assessed property that is used for each such business."

The committee believe that the information obtained by the carrying out of the above reolution will be of great assistance in solving the problem before them.
