THE SAME OLD STORY.

The proposal to move the electric light plant at Centre Island to the water works station on the south shore will meet the fate that has been in store for it all along. The sub-committee yesterday decided against amalgamating the plants this year, although they give us to understand the amalgamation will take place next year. Just so. The present is a particularly inopportune time for the city to make a move in the direction of securing cheaper electric light. The proposal to do anything which might interfere with the monopoly of the Toronto Electric Light Company is always inopportune. Not just now, but later on is the cry that is raised whenever it is proposed that the city should instal a plant of its own in any shape or form. We are constantly told that we are on the eve of new developments in electricity, and that a lighting plant is liable to be relegated to the scrap heap at any moment. The result of it all is that while all enterprising business houses that use a large number of lights are making their own current, the City of Toronto makes no effort to extricate itself from the electric monopoly. The Electric Light Company is so much interested in preventing the city from going into the lighting business that it will undertake to light the court house at less than cost price, sooner than see the city instal a plant of its own in that building. The fine hand of the company is also seen in the Island lighting project. In order to help the city to make enough light for the Island and thereby obviate the necessity of our acquiring a plant large enough for the purpose, the Toronto Electric Light Company generously comes to our assistance and offers to supply the deficiency. The company alleges it has made some kind of a deal with the Toronto Ferry Company, whereby it can supply so many lights to the city from the Ferry Company's plant. The Electric Light Company would almost undertake to light the Island for nothing soon: than see the city producing electric current as cheaply and economically as it could be produced by making use of the advantages and facilities of the water works station. There is no doubt in the world that the cheapest way to light the Island is by generating electric current at the water works station. A given amount of money will produce more lights and pump more water if the plant that combines the two same money will do if the plants are located at two different points and are managed by two different sets of men. What the company fears is that the success of a combined electric and pumping plant on the Island may lead to a combined plant for the city. That is the real reason why the proposal to amalgamate the Island plant with the city plant. The Toronto Electric Light Company has not only a monopoly of electricity in Toronto, but it exercises a virtual monopoly over the City Council.

THE MYSTERY OF THE SPANISH FLEET. It is characteristic of Americans to wish to do things quickly. They would like to finish the war and settle down to business again before hot weather begins. They are already getting very impatient because the victory at Cavite has not been followed up by an sudden attack on Cuba. There is naturally a tendency to compare the Spaniards with the friends of the acting-Admiral of the Atlantic fleet in that they would have done as much as Dewey if the Government had allowed him the same freedom of action. But the Spaniards are really to blame for Sampson's inactivity. If they had come across the Atlantic to meet him, or had even cabled to the United States Government where their fleet could be found there would have been a battle long ago. The great puzzle of the war is, what part are they going to take in the war? Ever since the war began the Spaniards have been pursuing a policy of what might possibly be regarded as masterly inactivity, but for their disastrous defeat in the Philippines. As soon as the trouble began their warships retired to the other side of the Atlantic. A section of the fleet remained in the vicinity of Spain, and most of the remaining warships were stationed at the Cape Verde Islands until the Portuguese ordered them to leave, when they apparently started for America as they sailed in a westerly direction, but now they are reported to be at the Spanish port of Cadix again. Whether they really are there is uncertain. Admiral Bermejo, Spanish Minister of Marine, denies that the fleet has returned to Cadix, and says it is where it ought to be in accordance with the instructions given its commander. The German newspapers, which have been exceedingly friendly to the Spaniards, seem to believe the story of the return to Spain and are severely condemning what seems to them a cowardly abandonment of the Spanish forces in Cuba and Porto Rico. Yet the Spanish Minister of Marine may be telling the truth. If so the question is, where was the commander of the Cape Verde fleet instructed to go? If the report of an engagement between Sampson's fleet and the Spanish should turn out to be true, the mystery would be solved, but if this should prove to be not authentic and the reported return to Cadix should not be confirmed, people might begin to wonder if the missing fleet could be sailing down the coast of South America on the way to the Pacific.
