STAND PIPE IS ALL RIGHT

Hamilton Waterworks Department Not Behindhand.

Can Get Up the Desired Flow in Six Minutes—Underwriters Will Decide Finally Next Week—Four Marriages in One Day—General News from Hamilton.

Hamilton, June 1.—(Special).—There was another round of the apparently never-ending fight over increased water pressure between the Fire and Water Committee and representatives of the Canadian Underwriters' Association this evening. The association representatives were: P. H. Sims, president; H. M. Blackburn, vice-president; W. Robbins, secretary; Inspector Howe, L. G. Thompson, J. B. Laidlaw, C. C. Foster and Alfred Wright, all of Toronto.

Mr. John Hoodless, for the Board of Trade, placed the city's side of the case before the underwriters, showing them how the city had gradually made the improvement asked for by the underwriters, except that of continuous pumping over the stand pipe.

Inspector Howe quoted from 1884 and 1891 reports and told the committee that it would be useless to enlarge the mains unless it was the proper force to push the water through the mains.

It transpired during the discussion that the underwriters learned for the first time that the city was carrying out as quickly as possible the recommendations of Engineer Kenting, made four years ago, and that pumping over the stand pipe could be obtained in six minutes and less.

The committee gave Inspector Howe authority to test the stand pipe pumping at any time on applying to the city engineer or clerk of the Water Works Department. Mr. Howe's finding would be given to the city engineer at once.

A decision in Hamilton's case will be arrived at the meeting of the Underwriters' Association in Montreal next week.
