PROCEEDINGS AT THE HAGUE

Sub-Committee of the Arbitration Committee Met and Discussed the Russian Scheme.

NAVAL AND MILITARY SECTIONS

Met and Exchanged Ideas - Will There Be a Permanent Tribunal of Arbitration?

The Hague, May 29.—The Drafting Committee, or sub-committee of the Arbitration Committee, met to-day and discussed the Russian scheme, adopting with slight modifications the first six articles. Count Nigra, chief of the Italian delegation, submitted a proposal of mediation and arbitration, consisting of six articles, in the form of an amendment to the Russian project.

The Americans also submitted an amendment demanding that in the event of a dispute between two nations, each should choose another nation to act as arbitrator to settle the dispute.

What The Times Says.

London, May 29.—The Times in an editorial dealing with the prospect that the result of the Peace Conference will be a permanent arbitration tribunal, says: "No Government or people have devoted themselves with greater ardor to the study of the theory of arbitration than the Government and people of the United States. The Americans not only possess great lawyers, but are a community in which knowledge of legal principles is more widespread than any other."

American Jurists have done much to mould the doctrines of international law in the past; and, in the treatment of large questions, they have often displayed luminous insight, firm grasp of fundamental principles, and a solid erudition not surpassed by the legal writers of any modern State."
