TWENTY-FIRST YEAR

KILLING OF KING HUMBERT THE RESULT OF AN ANARCHIST PLOT

Everything Goes to Show That the Assassination Had Been Long Premeditated—The Assassin Traced in Europe.

Five Other Persons Have Been Taken Into Custody at Monza—King Victor Emmanuel Hastening to His Father's Bier—Morbidity Thirst for Notoriety is the Plague of Modern Civilization, Says Lord Salisbury—Assassin's Wife Interviewed.

Rome, July 31.—The police are pushing inquiries in all directions, but the information with regard to the assassin, Bresci, is not yet very definite. It appears that when he was searching for lodgings on Friday at Monza he was accompanied by a young man, whom the police are now seeking. The pistol the assassin used was a new and superior weapon, marked Massachusetts.

What a Search Revealed.—The police of Milan searched the house of a man named Benella, and it is reported found important papers showing that Bresci had relations with persons in the United States, and that communications had passed between him and them in connection with the crime. Bresci and another Tuscan frequented the cafes in Milan, where they were overheard discussing a big scheme that would astonish the world.

Was Long Premeditated.—Everything goes to show that the crime was long premeditated and the police are now being charged with want of foresight. It appears that the cordons formed upon the arrival of the King at the fete grounds were withdrawn prior to his departure. As the King was leaving a sort of scuffle occurred, probably prearranged to distract the attention of the carabinieri.

The King was so pleased with his welcome at Monza and felt so safe that he turned to his aide and said: "I'd like to return home," but he was dissuaded.

WAS THERE A PLOT?

Meeting to Arrange for the Killing of King Humbert May Have Been in Paris.

Rome, July 31.—The Tribune says the assassination of King Humbert is believed to have been the result of a plot. A non-militant anarchist recently declared, so the Tribune asserts, that a meeting had been held in Paris, at which lots were drawn, and several persons were selected to kill the King.

The papers announce that King Victor Emmanuel III. will reach Brindisi to-day, and will go directly to Monza.

Besides Bresci five persons have been taken into custody at Monza.

ASSASSIN TAKEN TO JAIL.

Bresci Placed in Safe Quarters—The Royal Princess Arrive at Monza.

Monza, July 31.—The assassin, Bresci, has been removed from the local police station to the jail.

Royal Princess Arrive.—Signor Saraceno, the Premier, on his arrival at the royal villa to tender his condolences to Queen Margherita, had an impressive audience lasting half an hour. All the royal princes, the Queen of Portugal and the Duke of Oporto have arrived here.

PLAQUE OF CIVILIZATION.

Is the Morbid Thirst for Notoriety of the Assassinator's Plague of Modern Civilization?

London, July 31.—Moving an address to the Queen with reference to the assassination of King Humbert of Italy, the Premier, Lord Salisbury, in the House of Lords today recalled that the last part of the century had seen the assassination of three Presidents of republics and two monarchs.

"It was a fearful thing," Lord Salisbury said, "to contemplate this depth of human villainy beneath the smiling surface of society, which threatened the destinies of society in the early future."

ITALY PERFECTLY TRANQUIL.

All the Italian Troops Have Taken the Oath of Allegiance to the New King.

Rome, July 31.—All the Italian troops today took the oath of allegiance to the new king amid the applause of the people. Quiet tranquillity reigns throughout the country.

A detachment of senators and deputies had arranged to meet King Victor Emmanuel; but, as in conformity with court etiquette, the journey of His Majesty to Monza is strictly private, the idea was abandoned. For a similar reason the Ministers declined not to go to Naples.

BLOW TO TRIPLE ALLIANCE.

Mrs. Emily Crawford's View of the Assassination of the King of Italy.

New York, July 31.—Mrs. Emily Crawford, coming from Paris about the assassination of King Humbert, tells how she, on two occasions, met the King, and then says: "Humbert's death is a mortal blow to the triple alliance. He was the single mainstay of the Cripin-Bismarck policy. Crispien claimed to power by adopting Humbert's ideas, which were rooted in a passionate desire to recover Savoy, the cradle of his race, and the burying ground of his ancestors. He was liberal from a sense of honor, but traditional in his feelings. His mind little differed from that of the ancestral Humberts, the Counts of Savoy. It was the mind of a feudal baron—narrow, direct, earnest and even touched with fanaticism, but honorable."

ITALIAN CABINET'S MANIFESTO.

Calls on the Nation to Rally With Unshakable Loyalty Around Humbert's August Successor.

Rome, July 31.—In the absence of the new King, the Ministry has issued in his name a manifesto to the nation as follows: "King Victor Emmanuel III., in ascending the throne, has to perform the painful duty of announcing to the country the awful calamity which has so violently cut short the valuable life of our beloved monarch. The nation, wounded in its sincere affection for the august dead, and in a sincere feeling of devotion and adherence to the dynasty while executing the cruel crime will be plunged into profound grief for the renovated memory of a good, brave and magnanimous monarch, the hero of his people, the worthy perpetuator of the traditions of the House of Savoy. PATERSON ANARCHISTS MEET.

Held a Meeting When They Endorsed the Killing of King Humbert.

All Monarchs Must Die.—New York, July 31.—There was a meeting of anarchists in Paterson, N.J., last night, at which the killing of King Humbert was endorsed. A reporter who sought an audience was welcomed, as it was said that the anarchists wanted the whole world to know their sentiments.

Says Bresci Was a Member.—The principal speaker at the meeting was Ernesta Cravelli. In an impassioned address she said: "We are members of the group of anarchists to which Bresci belonged. He is a martyr. He has done what we would have him do. It was not our instruction to Bresci to kill, but he has done what he knew to be right, and we will sustain him and give him our sympathy. Humbert was a monarch, and all monarchs, according to our views, must die."

THE ASSASSIN'S WIFE.

His Wife, When Interviewed, Says She Did Not Know That Her Husband Belonged to Any Organization, But He Hated Kings.

New York, July 31.—Gaetano Bresci, who assassinated Humbert of Italy, was a native of Tuscany, Italy, and came to the United States five years ago. He was not a naturalized American citizen, but his wife is of American birth. Bresci left Paterson, N.J., on May 22, sailing for Havre by the French Line steamer La Gascogne.

What Bresci Told His Wife.—He told his wife that he was going to visit his birthplace in Italy to look after a little property that belonged to him. It was only when she read that the assassin in Milan had confessed his name and gloried in his crime that his wife believed. Her husband assumed a dejected pallor, and sank into a chair trembling. Then she exclaimed: "My God, can it be true? I cannot believe it. It's hardly two months since he left me, and it was only three days ago that I got a letter from him telling me how happy he was, and how soon he expected to be home."

STORY OF INDIAN SAVAGERY WHICH COMES FROM THE GATINEAU.

Tete De Boule is Alleged to Have Slain His Uncle With an Ax and Drowned His Baby Girl and His Wife by Holding Their Heads Under Water.

Ottawa, July 31.—(Special.)—A terrible story of human depravity reached the city to-day from the Gatineau. It is the details of a triple murder at Lake Labriere, near Tete de Boule, an Indian. It is alleged he killed all his relatives, his uncle, his child and his wife. The story is fiendish beyond all human imagination. Two years ago, in a rage, it is said, the man slew his wife with an ax. His wife and baby girl were out hunting beaver. The six-month-old child raised a little cry of distress, and the man, because this disturbed the beaver, it is stated, tore the girl from her mother's arms and held her head under in the water till life expired. Then he handed her back to the mother, who, after a few months, it is alleged, killed his wife. It was winter, and he took her out to the ice and cut a hole there in it. Thus his hole he held her head downwards till life was extinct. Then he took her body away and hid it.

GAETANO BRESCI IS THE NAME OF KING HUMBERT'S ASSASSIN.

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A Dangerous Problem.—The allies now confront a most difficult and dangerous problem. Without doubt the Ministers are held as hostages—Lieut.-General Von Lassel will be Commander-in-Chief of the Allied Forces when the Advance Begins.

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ASSASSIN IN NEW YORK.

Was a Silk Weaver in an Anarchist Group in Paterson—What He Looks Like.

New York, July 31.—The assassin of King Humbert was known in Paterson, N.J., as Gaetano Bresci, not as Angelo Bresci. Bresci lived at the Hotel Bartoloni, 202 Straight-street. He was employed as a silk weaver at Hamill & Booth's factory. Bresci was described last night by A. L. Lanza, the proprietor of the hotel, as a man about 20 years old, 5 feet 8 inches in height and weighing 150 pounds. He had a dark mustache and walked with a slight stoop of the shoulders. He seldom drank, was never known to be intoxicated and was a man of few words. He spoke English well, his wife and a young daughter lived at West Hoboken and are still there, so far as Bresci's friends in Paterson know, he did not take his family with him to Italy. His wife is not an Italian. Bresci went to Paterson about a year ago. He left on June 15.

THE BODY OF THE KING.

Will Be Taken to Rome on Sunday—Message of Condolence From Li Hung Chang.

Rome, July 31.—Late this evening it is reported that the body of King Humbert will be brought here on Sunday. Queen Margherita desires to accompany the body. Emperor William has notified the Government of his intention to attend the funeral. A despatch of condolence has been received from Li Hung Chang.

THE GENEVA ANARCHISTS.

Keep Up Regular Correspondence With the Community in Paterson, N.J.

Geneva, July 31.—In spite of all the efforts the police have not succeeded in identifying the assassin of King Humbert as the man Bresci, who was watched here in 1898. The authorities are only able to affirm one thing, namely, that the Geneva anarchists, who are mostly Italians, are in regular correspondence with their countrymen in Paterson, N.J., from which point all orders come.
