## 200 Lives Are Lost In Western States By Flood and Fire

Kansas, Missouri, Iowa and Nebraska  
Swept by Torrents From Many  
Raging Rivers.

### APPALLING CONDITIONS AT TOPEKA

Headlines Cared Up in Building  
With Little Hope of Rescue  
Unless Water Recedes.

Topeka, Kans., May 31.—There is ground for hope that the worst of the flood situation has passed. The treacherous Kansas River, which rose during the day, is tonight slowly receding, and the five mile wide stream is settling back into its rightful channel. With 175 or 200 lives lost, millions of dollars of property destroyed, with hundreds of people still in the clutches of unrelenting waters, the situation is a grim one. The people of Topeka are now waiting for the water to recede, and for the city to be saved.

### RESCUED MANY PERSONS

The arduous work of the heroic rescuers was not abandoned in the least by the conditions which confronted them. For long dreary hours, knee deep in water, and sometimes up to their necks, they worked with might and main. To-night they can point to 200 or more rescued persons who otherwise might have been swept away in the current.
