NO WAY OUT OF IT

Revision Court Says Mr. Bayley Must
Pay Tax.

The court of revision yesterday af-
ternoon heard several assessment ap-
peals. Amongst them was the ap-
peal of Mr. Charles H. Bayley, a former
drygoods merchant of London, who
claimed that he was being compelled
to pay a business tax for 1906, despite
the fact that he sold out his business
and went to Toronto in March or
April of that year. He asked for re-
mission of the taxes.

A letter from City Solicitor Mer-
edith was read, stating that an appeal
must be entered, according to the act,
in the year for which the taxes are
due, and that further the court of re-
vision has only power to remit taxes
for three causes—charity, gross error,
or when the premises have been vac-
ant a term.

It was pointed out that Mr. Bayley
had not made application for the re-
mission of the taxes until this year,
and that there had been no gross er-
ror, and that the premises had not been
vacant, and that Mr. Bayley was not
seeking remission on the grounds of
charity. Consequently, the application
of Mr. Bayley was thrown out, the
court having no power.

Collector Hayes will now be in-
structed to collect the taxes at once.
Chairman McMahon, Mr. James
Egan, Assessment Commissioner Grant
and City Clerk Baker were present.

**GALA DAY ASSURED
BY HIGHLANDERS**

**Splendid Programme Has Been
Arranged for Victoria Day
at Queen's Park.**

A splendid programme for the 24th of
May has been arranged by the officers
of the Sixth Field Battery and the
Seventh Regiment.

The Forty-eighth Regiment of High-
landers from Toronto will be here on
that day, and the soldiers will be ac-
companied by their famous band, which
in the past two years has traveled
about 30,000 miles.

In addition to the Highland Regi-
ment, the Seventh Regiment and the
Field Battery, there will also be on the
field at Queen's Park, where the sports
will be carried out, the First Hussars,
and the local Army Medical Corps.

The Forty-eighth will arrive here on
the night of May 23 at midnight, and
will immediately march to Queen's
Park, where they will go under canvas.
The afternoon of the following day
they troop the course, and the people
of London will be privileged to witness
the maneuvers which set New York
wild when the Highlanders visited that
city.

The Regiment will also be accom-
panied by its band of 20 pipers, who
will put on a special programme of
dancing and Scottish songs.

The Sixth Field Battery will give a
musical drive before the stand, to
music furnished by the massed bands
of the regiments on the field.

Arrangements have not been as yet
complete for the part the Seventh will
take in the programme.

At night, a military tattoo will be
held, and the Highlanders will put on
a fancy drill with torches.

The Highlanders will also put on the
famous bivouac scene, which made
such a hit in Massey Hall, Toronto.

Thus the 24th of May in London this
year promises to be one of the most
entertaining holidays the citizens have
ever enjoyed.
