Photoplay News

"The Birth of a Nation" at the Patricia All This Week.
D. W. Griffith's grand production has broken so many records in so many different ways that it is hard to keep track of them. For lengths of runs and total attendance it holds the records in New York, Chicago, Boston, Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, St. Louis, San Francisco, Los Angeles, Montreal, Toronto and Winnipeg. In fact, it has done the same thing in every city where it has played, and it is now duplicating the marvelous records in London, Sydney, Buenos Ayres and other great cities on five continents.

The national crisis of 1861-71 as pictured in fair play gave great lessons. The North and South in internecine struggle, the strategy of the Petersburg campaign, and the vast sweep of Sherman's march to the sea; Lee's surrender, the baneful Reconstruction period—all these form a series of martial and political events that enchain the spectator's interest. Out of that terrible conflict a new nation, united by brotherly, as well as geographical ties, was born.

Miss Fouché was born in Shreveport, La., daughter of one of the oldest French families in the South, the lineage on her father's side extending back to the nobles in France. When she was seven years old, she entered St. Francis Academy for girls, a convent in Shreveport, where she remained until she was fifteen. Then she removed to Texas, where her father was in business. She went into moving pictures a little more than a year ago.

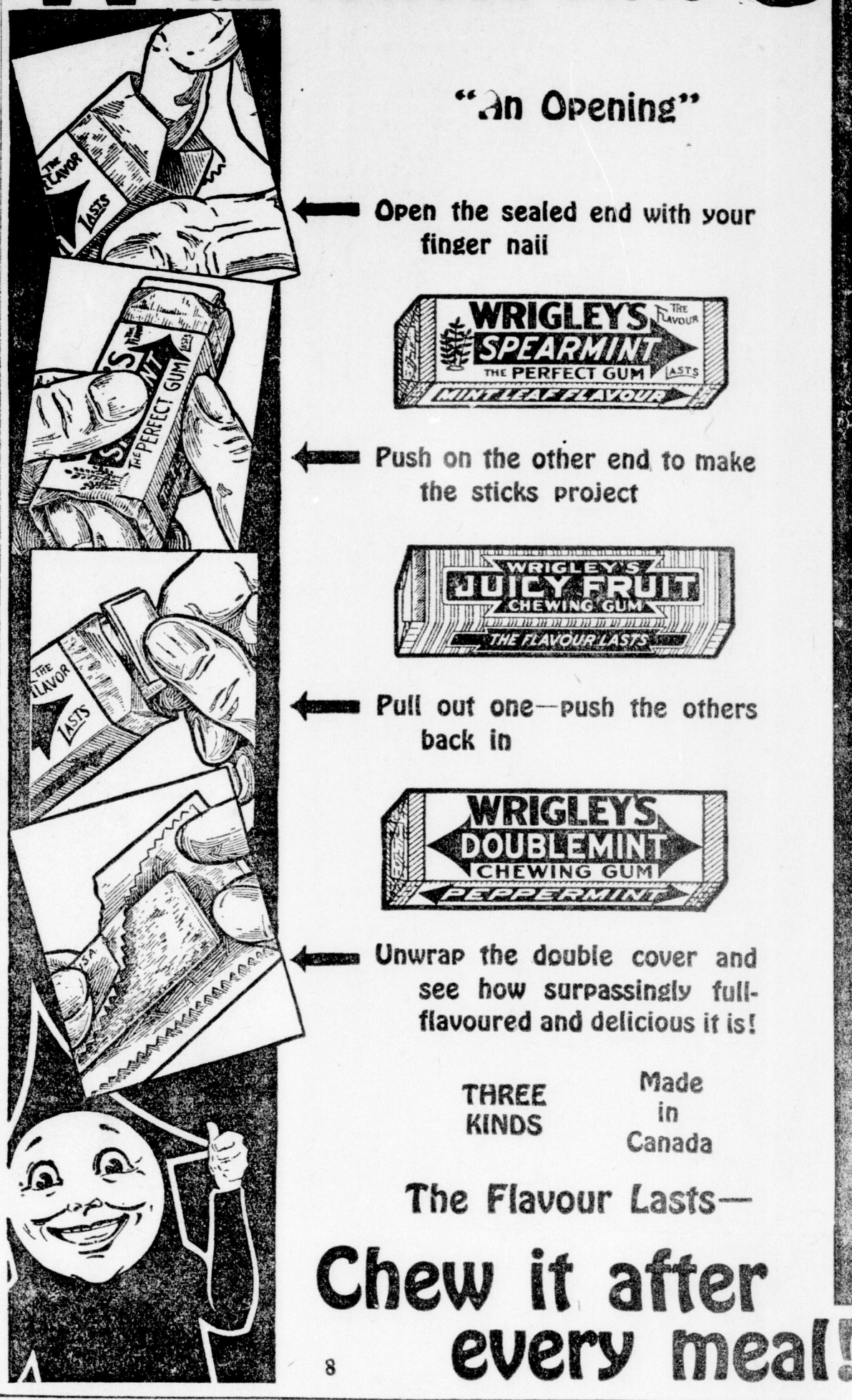
