## HEARST EXPRESSES CONFIDENCE GOVT. WILL BE RETURNED

Says Record Has Justified H. R. H. Recognizes Sergeant Who Was Runner For Sir Such a Belief.

Sir William Points To This as One of Government's Accomplishments.

Hearst, premier of Ontario, addressed large gathering here tonight in suport of Major T. L. Kennedy, the sollier-Conservative candidate for Peel in he forthcoming provincial general elecons. Sir William dealt at some length with the record of the Government, which he claimed was such as to justify the belief that the Government would

be returned to power. He expressed himself as confident on this point, and said the Government had no fears as to the outcome. The various acts of the Government were referred to in substantiation of this faith. Chief among them was the hydro-electric policy, which he claimed had done much to maintain and make sure the industrial supremacy of this province. He said that the hydro-electric province. He said that the hydro-electric had prevented a complete industrial collapse during the fuel shortage of a year ago, and today took the place of 50,000,000 tons of coal alone.

Sir William declared that the completion of the plants at Niagara would add 300,000 horsepower to the hydro-electric equipment, and make it the most economic power development in the world.

Dealing with the temperance question ir William pointed out that the policy Sir William pointed out that the policy of the Government was the continuation and the natural development of the temperance policy of the late Sir James Whitney. The late leader of the Conservative party had pledged himself to be ever on the alert to advance the cause of temperance and to seize every opportunity to promote sobriety.

Under the administration of Sir James Whitney the liquor licenses in Ontario Under the administration of Sir James Whitney the liquor licenses in Ontario were reduced from 2,800 in 1904 to 1,600 in 1914, a reduction of 1,200. Local option in 1906 had made 96 municipalities dry, and in 1914 it had made 347 municipalities dry. When the war came and the nations were training and stripping themselves like athletes for the struggle, it became the duty of the Government to further curtail the liquor traffic as a means of increasing is


