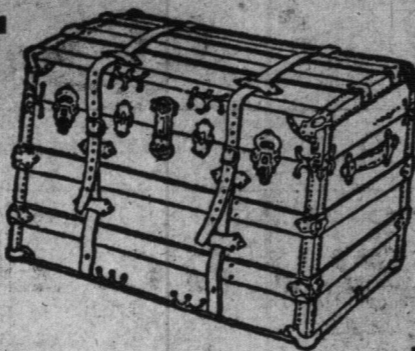

TIPOS DEFEAT A MOTION FOR \$5 INITIATION FEE

Mortuary Benefit Changes Announced—Winnipeg Delegate's Wardrobe.

ST. JOSEPH, Mo., Aug. 10.—(Special).—An attempt to fix five dollars as the minimum initiation fee, two dollars of which should be transmitted to the international treasury, was defeated after a warm debate by the International Typographical Union to-day, and is considered a victory for anti-administration forces.
