Dr. Shearer did not see any objection to buying stocks on margins. He refused to answer a question as to who was paying his expenses.

Mr. Monk thought Dr. Shearer and his associates had shown a singular neglect in the matter of obtaining information about English conditions and English legislation. To Mr. Counsell, Dr. snearer said he had no personal knowledge of evils from race-course betting.
