May Be Ten Mills. After checking over the school es-timates, the city treasurer reports that the expenditure called for be taken care of by a 91/2 mill rate, Boston Naples Halifax Havre Halifax Manchester Havre but if the accumulated debt left over from last year is to be cleaned up, the rate will have to be ten mills, the same as last year's.
