The work is going ahead rapidly, but China has a population of 400,000,000 people. That number may not be considered as large as it is, but according to Mr. Stevens' figuring it would take the whole population thirteen years to pass any point, one person passing every second.

The lecture was very interesting, and interested the fair-sized audience greatly.

AUTO CAB IN RIVER THREE DROWNED

Driver Loses Control of the Machine Which Runs into the Hudson.

New York, June 15.—Two women and a child were drowned and two men narrowly escaped death when a taxicab automobile became uncontrollable on West Fifty-sixth street last night and ran down the dock at the foot of the street and into the Hudson River. The dead are: Miss Adelaide Borden, aged 19; Mrs. Joseph Coleman, aged 22; Virginia Knight, aged 8.

The driver of the taxicab, John Nolan, fell into the water with the machine. He was able to swim, however, and was rescued. Joseph Coleman, a chauffeur, husband of one of the victims, jumped from the automobile before it reached the end of the pier.

All are residents of this city, the home of the Coleman and of Miss Borden, and the Knight child being on West Fifty-first street.

THE GREAT RALLY OF REPUBLICANS

First Day of the Convention at Chicago—12,000 Seats Filled.

Chicago, June 16.—Chicago put forth her best in the way of weather conditions for the opening of the Republican national convention today. California led a parade scene as the Auditorium to the convention hall this morning, followed by Colorado, Nevada, Washington, Idaho and Hawaii. Marching clubs, playing bands and steadily increasing crowds made a gay and picturesque scene as the day wore on, and the hour of meeting approached.

Twelve thousand seats in tiered ranks all over available inch of space, save for sufficient aisles and entrances, yet there is no appearance of crowding.

Today's programme was essentially preliminary.

NO EVIDENCE OF CROOKEDNESS

Further Investigation of the Charges Against Marine Department.

[Special to The Advertiser.]
Ottawa, June 16.—The investigation before Judge Cassels, of the general charges made in the civil service commission report against the staff of the marine department, was continued this morning, the examining counsel, Mr. George Watson, K. C., taking up the dealings of the Canadian Fog Signal Company with the department.

John P. Northey, of Toronto, one of the three members of the company, told of the sales of diaphanes to the department since 1902. Probably

about 40 of these had been supplied, and the profit in each would be about \$4,000. There had been a loss, however, on the plant supplied, in connection with the diaphanes. The total profits, said Mr. Northey, on what was sold the Government were about 29 per cent. He said he might have received \$150,000 in profits from the company within the last five years, the Government being the main customer. The company was now making about \$70,000 per year profit. Witness explained that they were selling a patented apparatus to the Government, and naturally got the most they could for it.

Col. Anderson, chief engineer of the department, had asked the company to sell the signals to the department, and no official or any employee of the department, said witness, had ever received a single cent from himself or from the company by the way of bribe, commission, or in any other way in connection with the business done.

Mr. Northey said he had taken a couple of trips to New York and Chicago with B. H. Fraser, assistant to Col. Anderson, but Mr. Fraser had always paid his own expenses.

A cigar perhaps was all any official ever got from me," he said. "I have no knowledge of any dishonest or unfaithful service on the part of anyone connected with the department."

Witness said that the Government were not advertising for tenders for diaphanes and plant. He could not say why diaphanes should be advertised for in view of the fact that his firm held the patent. Any firm could supply the plans. Col. Anderson, he added, had told him he thought the price was high and that a profit of 25 per cent on the patented apparatus should be enough.

Capt. Demers, chief examiner of masters and mates, was briefly examined with respect to work of his branch. He stated that he knew of no act of dishonesty on the part of any official in the department.

A BRONX ZOO GATOR ATTACKS ITS KEEPER

The 350-Pound Reptile Imagines Itself Back in Florida.

New York, June 16.—Because his jungle surroundings are too homelike is the reason assigned for an attack made by Moe, the large alligator in the Bronx Park zoo, upon Keeper Charles Snyder.

Moe, who weighs 350 pounds and is nine feet long, came from Florida three months ago. There, in the Everglades along the St. John's River, he had reached his growth. At the zoo he was placed in the reptile tank house. Palms shaded him when he cared to sleep, and the sun warmed him when he wanted to crawl out upon the sand and talk gator to four fellows who had been taken from their happy home and consigned to a tank life.

Moe escaped from the tank and sought the pebbled walk until the keeper came along. Then Moe, imagining he was back home, swished his tail and the keeper went down in a heap.

The reptile house was crowded with visitors. While some made a rush for the doors, the large alligator climbed the tree in his cage to referee the fight, and many of the spectators remained to witness the battle. Some one, afraid of police interference, announced that he was a "member of this club."

Snyder was knocked down three times before the alarm which he had sent in for help brought aid. Then several keepers threw a net over Moe, and the 350 pounds of animated leather satchel material were hauled back to the tank.
