IT WAS GANS
IN THE FIFTH

Britt Broke His Wrist in That Round, but Negro Had Best of it in Any Case.

San Francisco, Cal., Sept. 9.—A left swing to the body, cleverly blocked by Gans, cost Jimmy Britt any chance he might have had to win the lightweight championship of the world today and ought to close five rounds of fast fighting before 14,000 persons at the recreation k.

The deciding blow was caught by Gans, the evok m the middle of the fourth round. It broke Britt's wrist and though ritt went on again in the fifth round, he was helpless in both offense and defense. It was not until this round that he informed his seconds of the mishap.

"What's the use of my going on? I can't fight. I am helpless," Britt said to Jv. Kreling, Captain of Police Gleason was informed at the ringside and he stopped the fight. Referee Welch gave the decision to Gans.

Three doctors after an examination announced that injury was a fracture and dislocation of the lower end of the ulna. Whether it was a genuine fracture or not Britt showed such intense suffering while the doctors were manipulating his wrist that the tears rolled down his cheeks.

"I was utterly helpless," he said. "I could not even hold up my left hand after I broke it. I had to guard Gans' left and had no punch except with my right. The fight while it lasted was a slugging match but it was evident to every trained observer that Britt had no chance to win from the negro. For the first time in his life, Britt was out-matched.

Kilrain has been seen for more than a week. Why he left so suddenly and where he went are still mysteries.

Kilrain and John L. had been showing in Salt Lake for several weeks, to big houses. Indeed since they started on tour they have both made a lot of money. On Wednesday of last week the two famous old pug mixed it in sharp fashion, showing some of their ancient prowess, and during the exchanges Sullivan landed a stiff punch on Kilrain's mouth, making one of his eyes teeth. The Englishman complained bitterly of the pain that resulted, saying that it extended up into his head. That evening, however, he started from his lodging place shortly after 8 o'clock as usual to take the stage at the Salt Palace with John L. He did not reach the playhouse, nor has he been heard from since.

SEASON OPENS

Marathons and Algonquins Have Good Squads Out—Some of Those Likely for the Season.

The football season is for St. John is at last under way, and though the turnouts for practice of the Marathons and Algonquins clubs was not large the boys went at their work with vim. The Greeks put in their work on the Victoria grounds. Each had about ten men out. There seems to be plenty of enthusiasm among the players which argues well for the season.

There is apparently nothing definite as to the composition of the city league but from present indications the Marathons, Algonquins and St. Peter's will form the league.

The intention of the players seems to be to have, though they may yet be found in line, it is, perhaps, too soon to figure on possible line ups, but the following are possibilities:

It is believed that the Indians will endeavor, in case the Beavers do not have a team, to get Kenney, one of the best full-backs in the city, Harry Simmons, the speedy half-back, who was captain of the Beavers in '06, and others of the green and red squad.

St. Peter's will meet in their hall tonight at 7:30 to decide definitely regarding their entry to the league. It is believed that they will decide in the affirmative in which case they will have a strong fifteen for the gridiron, far stronger than last season. Besides some dark horses they will probably have most of the men of last season, including Moses Cohen, McCloskey, Mason, Carter, Sears, and Rogers.
