REPORTS FROM MISSIONS.

GLENCOE.

This field of labor has five appointments. Our congregations are small at all the appointments except in the village of Glencoe, where it is very large. This is certainly a fine appointment. It has a membership of about eighty. As a denomination we stand high in the village of Glencoe. In Newbury we labor under a great disadvantage—the want of a church; our people at this appointment are poor, hence the difficulty in building a church. During the past year we have had a revival, and there have been forty or upwards added to the Church. As a circuit it is prospering, and is destined to take a high position in our work if properly managed.

GODERICH MISSION.

Our cause in this town demands a new church edifice; but the church is financially weak and unable to move in the matter, unless they can be assured of the sympathy and hearty co-operation of the adjoining circuits. The subject has been agitated by your missionary, but, owing to the financial depression of the country, no decisive step has been taken. The mission has lost by removals 10, but 15 have united on probation, so that we report a net increase of 3. Total membership 43. We thank God and take courage.
