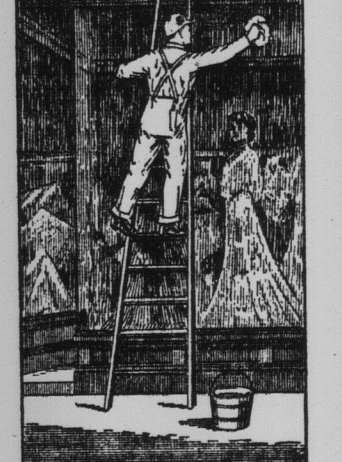

Rexton, Sept. 12.—Henry Powell, a well-known and respected resident of Buctouche, died at his home there Sunday. He was born at Richibucto sixty-nine years ago and was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Powell. He is survived by his wife.

The funeral took place at Buctouche Wednesday at 2.30 p.m.

#### Mrs. James Bain.

Yarmouth, N.S., Sept. 12.—At her home in Yarmouth, N.S., Mrs. James Bain, wife of the late Mr. James Bain, died. She was a daughter of the late George and Matilda Trask of Chequoggin and was fifty-four years old. She leaves a son, Mr. James Bain, and two daughters, Mrs. Margaret, at home.
