Haven't you often wondered how in the world a hat which had been trimmed with some kind of fragile trimming could be lined without mussing it all up. The answer to this question is shown in Figure 2 above. You will see that it will be impossible then to sew the ends together in an ordinary seam, and this is another point, over which amateurs have had to puzzle. Instead of seaming the ends, up, one edge is turned, under, over the other one, and they are then slip-stitched together. Slip-stitch ing is simply taking one long stitch inform slipping.

To begin the lining buy one-quarter of a yard of thin taffeta or lining silk, the length determined by three times the diameter of the hat. First turn over the lengthwise edge of the silk a half inch and stitch it down to form a casing. Sew

PLAN FOR GUARDS ON UNITED STATES BORDER

Vancouver, B. C., Jan. 25—Major W. Tait and Colonel F. B. Gregory of the Canadian National Reserve will meet Major General Sam Hughes in Victoria today, and lay before him a plan for guarding the boundary line between Canada and the United States with men Canada and the United States with men of the reserve force.

They will suggest that the men of the reserve be placed at short intervals along the frontier to act in co-operation with United States officials not only in keeping out any war-mad Germans, but also in seeing that German reservists in Canada do not go into the United States.
