

"MRS. KAROYLI" IN MONTREAL, PROVES TO BE COUNTLESS

Admits Family May Move to Western Canada; Won't Visit U. S.

Canadian Press Despatch.
MONTREAL, Nov. 9.—Countess Karoyli, wife of Hungary's war-time prime minister, arrived from overseas here today and registered at a local hotel as plain "Mrs. Karoyli."
She told press representatives that "she was out here purely on a personal visit."
"My trip," the Countess added, "has absolutely no particular significance."
Faced with the interest which might be evoked from her visit in connection with the American continent during the tour of Queen Marie, of Rumania, in the light of press rumors of diplomatic pourparlers between Hungary and Rumania, the Countess flatly disclaimed any connection with her plans. She professed complete ignorance as to the Rumanian Queen's whereabouts, and declared that it was not her intention of entering the United States. She explained that the Karoyli family

had been living quietly in Paris for several years, and that she herself had not been in Hungary since her visit to America in 1925. "I have nothing to do with politics," she declared.

Beyond stating that she intended to visit Western Canada and look over some farms in Saskatchewan the countess revealed nothing of her future plans. In answer to a query from a reporter that the Karoyli family would come to live permanently in Canada, the countess replied, "Possibly. We had the idea of leaving Europe some five years ago, and then things changed. Now we are interested again."

During Countess Karoyli's visit to the United States a year or so ago, she was joined by her husband, but the latter was refused permission to address gatherings in that country. The Countess at that time journeyed to Washington in an endeavor to have the order restricting her husband from speaking publicly rescinded, but to no avail. Both later visited Canada.

SPEED OF LIGHT IS OVER-ESTIMATED

186,319 Miles Per Second Reckoning Found 40 Miles Too Fast

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Nov. 9.—Many calculations in astronomy and physics now generally accepted as final, may be discarded and revamped in light of the recent discovery of Prof. Albert A. Michelson of the University of Chicago, that the speed of light has been overestimated.

The distinguished scientist announced his discovery yesterday.
Light, regarded as the fastest thing in the universe, hitherto had been said to travel approximately 186,319 miles a second. Michelson declared this figure was nearly 40 miles too fast. The speed of light, he said, he had found should be 299,796 kilometres, instead of 299,860 kilometres a second.
Since the calculated speeds of the earth through space and of the astronomical bodies and the distances of the universe have been based on the established rate which light travels, all these figures must now be corrected, scientists declared, if the new figure is accepted.

WATER CONTINUES IN SPRINGHILL MINE

SPRINGHILL, Nov. 9.—There was apparently no change today in the water condition at No. 2 colliery, where a sudden lurch of water for the past ten days has caused considerable anxiety and caused the withdrawal of the working force at the lower levels of the mine. HOUSES WILL MEET EARLY IN DECEMBER

Cabinet Said to Have Talked Over Appointment of Massey

OTTAWA, Nov. 9.—Parliament will meet early in December.

This was the intimation made by Hon. J. A. Robb, acting prime minister, at the conclusion of today's meeting of the Cabinet Council.

While it is understood that no definite decision has been arrived at, it is rumored that Thursday, Dec. 9, now appears to be the most likely date for the convening of the House. Tuesday, Dec. 7, was originally suggested as the probable date for the opening, but it is intimated that as the following day is a holiday it has been practically determined that Parliament will not convene on the seventh of next month. An announcement in the matter is expected to be made within the next day or two.

Another matter which it is understood was under consideration today was that of the appointment of Hon. Vincent Massey as Canadian representative at Washington. No official statement was forthcoming tonight, although it is intimated that the appointment may come before tomorrow's meeting of the cabinet.
