Light, regarded as the fastest thir Light, regarded as the fastest thing in the universe, hitherto had been said to travel approximately 186,310 miles a second, Michelson declared this figure was nearly 40 miles too fast. The speed of light, he said he had found should be 299,796 kilometres, instead of 299,860 kilometres a second.

Since the calculated speeds of the earth through space and of the astronomical bodies and the distances of the universe have been based on the established rate which light travels, all these figures must now be corrected, scientists declared, if the new figure is accepted.
