Silver Skate Meet Next Wednesday In Arena Arousing Interest

PITTSBURGH HAS CHANCE TO GET BACK TO THIRD

"Red" Stuart Gets Two Goals Against New York

BOSTON, Feb. 19.—Because of the popularity of the professional hockey game, the directors of the Boston Arena have decided to install a balcony to add additional seating capacity of 3,000, it was announced today.

The work will be done during the summer. With 8,000 seats and standing room accommodations for 5,000, the arena next season will have capacity for 13,000 fans at a hockey game.

NO MATTER what happens to Tommy Milligan tonight against Jack Zivic, Pittsburgh, win, lose or draw, he will probably be matched against a promising young British writer in the person of Jack Hood when Tommy gets back to dear old England. Hood is a Birmingham product whose most recent victory was one by a wide margin over a colored boy by the name of Len Johnson, who was considered some pumpkins overseas. Immediately after his decisive victory over Johnson, Hood said that he was sorry that Milligan was in America but that he could easily wait until the Scotman returns for a fight with him. "He is a man after my own heart," remarked Hood. "He can box and he can fight and I modestly lay claim to being able to do the same. I am ambitious but in no hurry to talk about world championships. I am only a youngster yet, and there is plenty of time for me to get right to the top." Joe Beckett and other men prominent in British boxing circles were at the ring-side to see Hood and Johnson in action and watch Hood with discerning eyes. After the bout they were agreed that he was every bit as good as his backers claimed he was and predicted a great future for him. Which is not much of a recommendation in itself. Mr. Beckett is the guy who made Carpenter famous by doing a few dives. He has a very discerning eye for soft spots in the ring and his favorite method of fighting was in a horizontal position. However, Mr. Hood may be as good as they say he is.

HARRY HOOPER, famous outfielder, has been given his unconditional release by the Chicago White Sox. He broke into baseball in 1902. He was a brilliant fielder and timely batter.

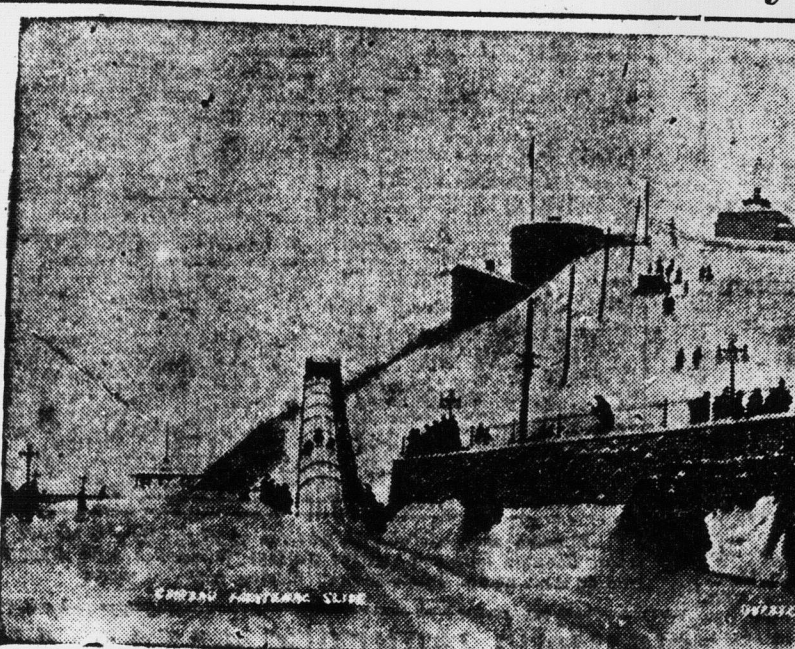
PRO. NEXT YEAR
