## CONGRU WANT TO HEAR FROM C. P. R. ABOUT SOUTH END DEVELOPMENT

**Commissioner to Write Sir Henry Thornton—Suggest-  
ed Exemptions on Incomes.**

The necessity for obtaining a declaration from the C. P. R. relative to their intentions so far as the development of the area south of Reid's point and between there and the Ballast wharf before the city spent any large sum of money in that vicinity was stressed this morning at a committee meeting by Commissioner Frink and Commissioner Thornton. The proposition to build crib work at Charlotte street extension was laid on the table for the time being. Commissioner Frink said that he would take the matter up with Sir Henry Thornton at an early date. No action was taken on the recommendation to repair the C. P. R. wharf at a cost of \$11,400, the opinion being expressed that the matter of exchange for No. 6 extension should be disposed of first.

### Tax Exemptions

It was decided to send bills to the Legislature, to allow the council to fix the salary of the chief of police and provide exemption on incomes for married men with two or more children under 16 years of age as follows: \$800 on incomes up to \$1,200; \$400 from \$1,200 to \$1,400 and \$200 from \$1,400 to \$1,600.

### Proposed Bond Issues

Commissioner Bullock presented a list of proposed bond issues for work to be done in the harbor department during the year 1924, as follows:

The commissioner said the first item would not be proceeded with if an exchange were not arranged with the Dominion Government for No. 6 extension. Commissioner Frink said that he could support this recommendation on the ground that practically no return was received from this property and also because of the negotiations being carried on to exchange the property. Commissioner Thornton said the council was entitled to more detail of the expenditure and he felt that nothing should be done until the matter of exchange of properties had been decided. He also urged that when the work was done it should be by tender.

of charge and no dividends were being paid upon their stock, and in lieu of this sometimes they accepted stock in payment; later, when there were stock dividends, perhaps amounting to half-yearly payments of four per cent. additional, amounts equal to the dividends had been given to them in the way of payment.

### Issue of New Stock

Repairs and restoration could only be effected in two ways—by the issue of new stock or the depreciation reserve fund. The request of the representative of the Board of Trade, to permit a higher rate to be charged, was considered as if the bigger fish were asking permission to swallow the smaller ones. This was always inadvisable in economic life. Mr. Weyman had intended to pay and the rates that they wanted other people to pay would shock the common sense of the community.
