That Lloyd George, in dealing with the unemployment problem does not adopt the method of sliding the responsibility gracefully on to the shoulders of a municipality is shown by the following from The London Times of November 25th:

Government Programme.

The Prime Minister, replying to deputation from the London County Council yesterday, surveyed the whole programme of the Government for the relief of unemployment. The deputation pressed for powers which could enable them to act promptly in beginning relief work specifically the acquisition of land for arterial roads, and the Prime Minister promised to do what is possible to secure for the Council immediate possession.

Practical Aid

The points of Mr. Lloyd George's exposition of the Government schemes are emboided in the following statement issued by the Cabinet Committee on unemployment yesterday:

Out of Work Donation—£35,000,000 already spent: to be increased to £40,-000,000 spent: for Disabled Men—for spent.

Livil Liabilities Department—£2,000,100 spent since the Armistice; £4,000,-000 to be spent.

Broken Apprenticeship Scheme—£1,-000,000 spent; £26,000,000 to be spent.

Altogether 5,525,000 men have been demobilized, of whom 250,000 are still out of work. These are mostly young men from 25 to 30 years of age, the majority unskilled and many married with families. They receive the out-of-work donation at £1 or £1 9s. per week.

Disabled Men—Twenty-two thousand firms on the King's Rol of Honor are employing 280,000 disabled men; 20,000 are still unprovided for.

Officers—Two hundred and thirty thousand demobilized; 15,000 are still out of work. The Government are asking business firms to take an officer for a year to learn their business, and to give an honorable undertaking to reappoint him another year to a post at a salary of not less than £4 per week. During the first of the two years the Government will give maintenance grants.
