The Prime Minister, replying to a

deputation from the London County

Council yesterday, surveyed the whole

programme of the Government for the

relief of unemployment. The deputa-

tion pressed for powers which could

enable them to act promptly in begin-

ning relief work specifically the acqui-

sition of land for arterial roads, and the

possible to secure for the Council im-

mediate possession.

Out of Work Donation—£25,000,000

already spent; to be increased to £40,-

000,000 by March 31 next.

Civil Liabilities Department—£2,000,000

000 spent since the Armistice; £4,000,-

000 to be spent.

Industrial Training for Disabled Men

—£2,000,000 spent; £25,000,000 to be

spent.

Broken Apprenticeship Scheme—£1,-

000,000 spent; £25,000,000 to be spent.

Land Settlement—£7,500,000 spent;

£25,000,000 to be spent.

Overseas Settlement—£50,000 spent;

£1,000,000 to be spent.

Quarter Million Idle.

Altogether 5,225,000 men have been de-

mobilized, of whom 250,000 are still out

of work. These are mostly young men

from 25 to 30 years of age, the majority

unskilled and many married with fam-

ilies. They receive the out-of-work do-
