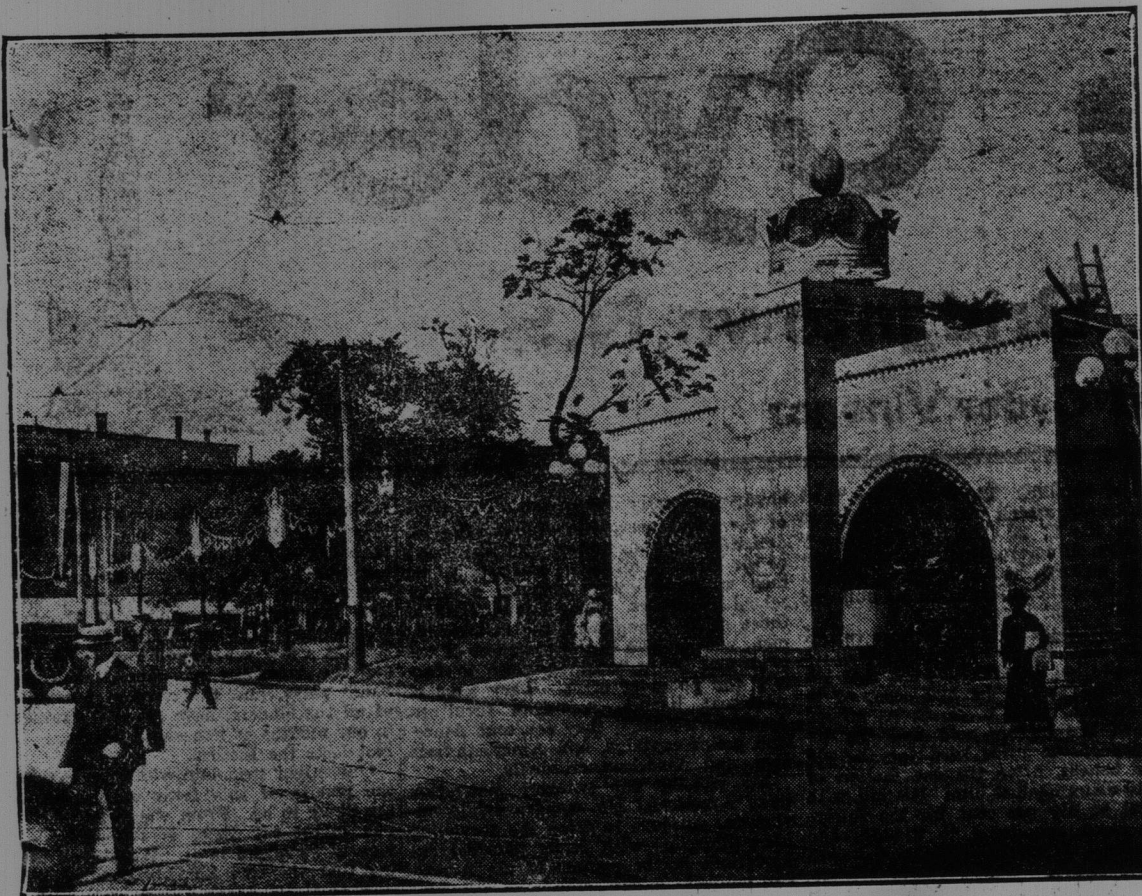

Returned Soldiers Are Honored Guests of St. John City Today

With City Gaily Decorated and Plans Complete, Citizens and Visitors Await With Eager Interest Arrival of Soldier Prince On Friday

The city has assumed a festive garb. King street is a veritable bower of flying flags, streaming pieces of bunting and sweet scented evergreen. Foremost among the King street decorations is the triumphal arch at the entrance to King square. Commanding and lofty it makes a fitting entrance to the square in the background. A huge crown surmounts the whole arch and running from it across and down to the ground are numerous electric lamps, which when lighted presents an entrancing sight. Running along from the main arch to either side of King Square there are many shields encircling lamp posts which are different emblems—the Rose, Shamrock, Thistle and Maple Leaf, out of all of which peeps the stately crown of Britannia, truly emblematic of the power, strength and beauty of the British Empire.

Across the street on the huge C.P.R. building is a large design of the Prince of Wales' feathers with a smaller design of the clasped hands beneath. Here also are great streamers of red white and blue with the building dotted with numerous flags, hunting and evergreen with a memorial tablet near the base bearing a verse of "In Flanders Fields" is backed with green.

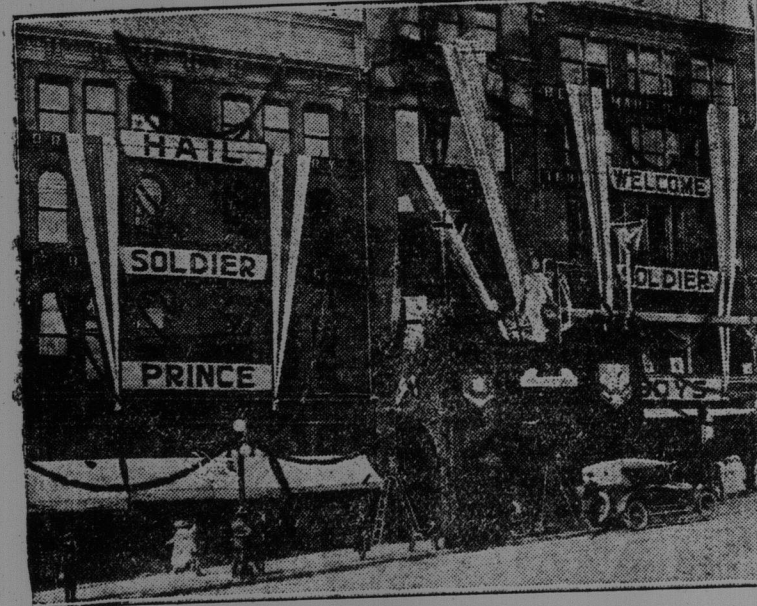
The T. McAvity & Sons building presents a becoming decorative appearance with large streamers running from top to bottom. In front on the electric posts which are draped with hunting are seen again the Rose, the Thistle the Shamrock and Maple Leaf.

Becoming decorations bedeck the Canadian Consolidated Rubber Company's building with a huge liberty bell in the centre at the top. Other buildings are making King street really "king" as regards decorations.

A trip to the armories and one sees a fine finished piece of decorative ingenuity. In the centre is a stand decorated with flags and presenting a neat appearance. Large streamers of red, white and blue flow from the outside of the drill hall to the centre. A Brussels carpet runs from the entrance door up to the stand along which path the Prince will walk.

At the Reed's Point pier the landing has been neatly finished in decorative style and the inside of the shed, leading from the landing to the outside of the wharf has been done in long streamers of decorations presenting a striking picture. Then immediately the large stand for the school children strikes the eye and when it is decorated with happy, pleasant smiling "kiddies" it will present a sight long to be remembered. Here the Prince gets his first taste of the real welcome that St. John will extend him for the day.

Military Orders.
Third New Brunswick Regt., C.G.A. Regimental orders by Lieutenant Colonel W. H. Harrison, D.S.O., commanding. St. John (N. B.), Aug. 13, 1919. In accordance with district order 1746, dated Aug. 13, 1919, a royal salute of twenty-one guns will be fired at the hospital steps, where over three hundred West St. John and Lancaster school children will be assembled to greet him. On his arrival three hearty British cheers and a tiger will be given, following which the children will sing God Bless the Prince of Wales and The March of the Men of Harlech. On his departure God Save the King will be sung. Arrangements have been made through Sir Joseph Pope, under secretary of state, to have the prince remain while the short programme is carried out. A band will be in attendance during these exercises. As this will be the only special feature marking the royal visit to the West End a large crowd will probably gather. The com-

mittee having this in charge is composed of William L. McDermid, J. F. Owens, R. H. Parsons and Enoch Thompson. D. Arnold Fox has accomplished splendid results in training the children to sing. Moving pictures of the event are to be taken for the Prince of Wales shows several changes as follows: From Reed's Point to armory via Prince William, King around south side of King square, (stop for few minutes where orphan children are assembled in front of Imperial Theatre), down Sydney, Mecklenburg and Carmarthen.

From armory to military hospital (West Side) via Carmarthen, Broad, Wentworth, Mecklenburg, around north side of Queen square, Queen, Germain and King, Market square, Dock, Mill, Main, Douglas avenue, (stop for few moments where school children are assembled at Riverview park), Lancaster avenue, Prince street.

From military hospital to Union Club via south gate, Lancaster avenue, Dufferin row, St. John street, up Watson, at Queen square (stop where children are assembled) down Queen, Ludlow (steep hill), St. John, Union, King, Ludlow, Prince (passing military hospital), Lancaster avenue, Douglas avenue, Main, Mill, Prince William to post office, to Duke, to Germain, to Union Club.

From Union Club to Rothesay via Germain, Wellington, Carleton, Coburg, Cliff, Waterloo to Rothesay. (Stop for few minutes where school children are assembled).

From Rothesay to ship via Waterloo street, Sydney, King street, Germain, Queen, Prince William to wharf. The probable disposition of the personnel of the prince's party and escort in the automobiles of the procession on Friday is:
