WANT BIG SUM FOR TROOPS.

Rockefeller Tells Catholics of Plans for

Soldiers' Comfort

More than 300 members of the National
Catholic War Council of the arch-
diocese of New York met last week in
the Hotel McAlpin to arrange for the
participation of the Knights of Colum-
bus in the United War Work drive for
\$170,000,000, which will start next month.
Auxiliary Bishop Hayes presided and
the speakers included John D. Rocke-
efeller, Jr.

At the request of Bishop Hayes, Wil-
liam P. Leach, director of the foreign
department of the knights, read a re-
port which disclosed that the organiza-
tion had collected up to date \$1,728,000,
of which New York had contributed \$4-
600,000. The report also showed that
460 X. of C. chapters were in France
and that fifty-three buildings back of
the lines had been erected, with ten in
England for the soldiers in transit or
on leave.

Mr. Rockefeller got an enthusiastic
reception when Bishop Hayes introduced
him to give the details of the non-sectarian
drive. Speaking of the goal
aimed at, Mr. Rockefeller said that un-
less the amount was largely over-
subscribed, it would be impossible to carry
out all the work contemplated.

"It has been calculated by experts
that twenty-five cents a day is needed
to give comfort to each of the 4,000,000
men in our armies. That is \$1,000,000
a day, or \$365,000,000 for the coming
year. And twenty-five cents a day does
not seem a great deal to spend for the
comfort of each man, but if the boys
at the front irrespective of religious be-
lief, can stand shoulder to shoulder for
our protection, is there any reason why
we should not stand together to furnish
them these needed comforts? This cam-
paign is an ocular demonstration to the
men at the front that the whole coun-
try is back of them. It is a union in heart-
iness, close sympathy and oneness of
purpose to bring them back as clean and
high-minded as they went."

Others who spoke were Bishop Pat-
rick J. Muldoon of Rockford, Ill., and
Mgr. John J. Dunn of New York.

CANADIAN GOVERNMENT RAIL-
WAYS, EFFECTIVE OCT. 15.

In order to meet the demand of labor
for an eight-hour day, the Canadian
Railway War Board has directed that,
effective October 15, 1918, all railway
freight sheds shall be opened for the re-
ceipt and delivery of freight on work-
days at 7:30 a. m. daily and closed at
6:00 p. m. daily, except on Saturday, on
which day the sheds shall be closed at
1 p. m.

The attention of the public is called to
the above regulations which will be-
come effective at Canadian Government
Railway stations on the date mentioned
above.

THOUGHT FATHER HAD
BEATEN BOY ENOUGH

Montreal Youth Interferes to Save
Brother and is Stabbed

Montreal, Oct. 14.—Charged with stab-
bing his son Emile, aged thirty, Arthur
Emile, fifty-nine years of age, was ar-
rested last night. Emile was trying to
save his younger brother from a beating
given by his father and had stepped between
the two, telling his father that he had
beaten the boy enough. The father
turned on his eldest son who, however,
was too strong for him, pushed him
away and started to take the boy out
of the room. Thereupon, it is alleged,
the father picked up a large carving
knife and stabbed Emile in the back.
The latter disarmed his father and later
lodged complaint at the police station.
Emile was taken to the Notre Dame
Hospital, where his wound was treated.
He was later allowed to proceed to his
home.

NEW-PRICE SHOES BY NOV. 1.

Dealers Have Until June 1 to Dispose
of Expensive Footwear.

Washington, Oct. 14.—Progress in
establishing the new maximum and mini-
mum price schedule for shoes from \$12
to \$8 is announced by Chairman Baruch
of the War Industries Board. By Nov.
1, it was stated, many stores will have
on their shelves the new classified shoes,
in addition to present stocks at present
prices.

"Orders now in the factory," the state-
ment said, "are for spring delivery, so
it follows that there will be a certain
portion of the product offered for sale to
the spring trade at a price in excess of
\$12. To permit these articles to be
cleaned out and also to permit the dis-
posal of the present stocks priced above
the top maximum, it has been agreed
that those retailers specializing in high
priced goods shall be given until June 1
to liquidate all their stock above the
class A (\$8-\$12) maximum."

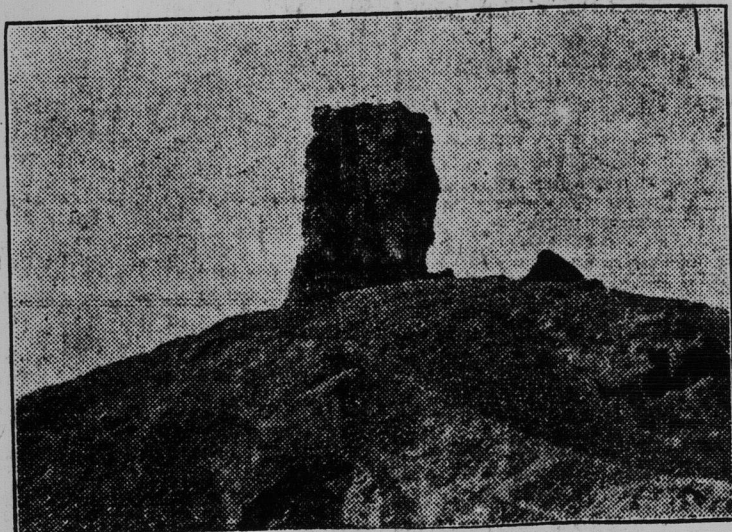
There is no restriction placed by the
War Industries Board on the sale or
purchase of the high priced shoes. On
the contrary, it was made plain that
those who can afford to buy them will
be co-operating in the liquidation of
these stocks now on hand. If these
stocks are not disposed of, the announce-
ment said, it will work a great
hardship to the trade.

INSURANCE MAN ENDS LIFE.

R. W. De Leon, Once Wealthy, Shoots
Himself in Lawyer's Office.

New York, Oct. 14.—Edwin W. De
Leon, fifty years old, an insurance
broker, with offices at 123 William
street, shot and killed himself in the
lawyer's office of Nash Rockwood, 927 Fifth
avenue. Associates attributed his com-
mitting suicide to recent financial re-
verses. Mr. De Leon, who until recently
had been wealthy, lived at his large
country estate at Norristown, N. J., with
his wife, and, according to neighbors,
the family had been a happy one. He
resigned as director and president of the
Casualty Company of America in 1916,
because, as he said, of internal condi-
tions which he was powerless to remedy
and which, he was convinced, would re-
sult in the company's downfall.
A telephone operator who found the
body said De Leon had called while Mr.
Rockwood was at dinner, and had asked

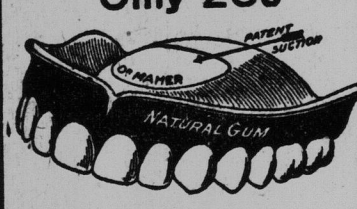
