URGES GREATER USE OF MOTORS

No Need of Conserving Gasoline in This Country, is Statement from High Source

Of interest in connection with repeated rumors of a possible shortage in gasoline, restrictive measures is the following received by John A. Fugazy from the general manager of Willis Overland, Ltd., Toronto:—

Petroleum War Service Board Urges Greater Use of Motors.

Instead of curtailing the use of motor vehicles, as has been necessary in England and France to conserve gasoline for military uses, our car and truck owners will be doing their country a service by using their machines to the fullest extent for the relief of passenger, freight and express traffic on the railroad in the United States and Canada, according to the Petroleum War Service Committee of the Council of National Defence.

The gasoline situation, which threatened last summer to result in a short-coming, due to campaign recently en-gaged by the United States Bureau of Mines, the drilling of new oil wells, in-creased production of gasoline by the "cracking process," decreased use of au-tomobiles during severe winter weather and lack of shipping facilities for ex-port to Europe have combined to cause consumption to fall below production.

The reserve supply accumulating will tax storage facilities to the utmost be-fore the winter is over. A statement issued by the Petroleum War Service Committee indicates that it is desirable to use gasoline for power
