PENNIES TO BUY ANOTHER HOUSE

Plodding Woman Newspaper Seller is Wealthy

AN EXAMPLE OF THRIFT

Immigrant From Russia, She Will, This Year, Complete 22 Years of Daily Attendance at Her Brooklyn Bridge Stand

New York, May 14.—Persons who pass along Park street, between the Brooklyn Bridge and the Bowling Green, will have seen Mrs. Rebecca Karp selling newspapers at her stand in the shadow of Brooklyn Bridge for a score of years each morning from midnight until nine o'clock, except on Saturdays and Sundays.

Mrs. Karp, who is fifty-six years old, lives in Brooklyn, in a comfortable three-story house, which she owns, and in which she houses all but one of the seven children she has brought up, and all but one of her seven grandchildren. And what is more, Mrs. Karp is completing arrangements to buy the house adjoining her home. After that she will still have money in the bank.

Twenty-two years ago she came to New York, with her husband, Samuel, and four children. Three more children were born in this city. The Karp family took up humble lodgings in a tenement, and Mrs. Karp went to work for she had always worked in Russia and did not think anything else was proper. Eight years ago she and her children moved to Brooklyn.

Since the first day she took up her stand in Park row, twenty-two years ago, Mrs. Karp has made and saved money. She has many customers of twenty years' standing, and has outlived many others. When her husband died, sixteen years ago, Mrs. Karp quit for a time, for she had a two-week-old baby to nurse. Her oldest daughter, Sara, now thirty-five years old, took her mother's place and sold the newspapers during the early rush hours of the day until her mother resumed her post.

One day a purchaser gave Sara a \$5 gold piece instead of a cent, and Sara did not know what it was until a friend told her. The next day the man came back and asked her if he had given her a \$5 gold piece. She told him he had and he told her to keep it, for Christmas was coming.

All of the time I work, said Mrs. Karp, in an effort to explain her wealth. "All of the time—rain, snow, or anything. It's cold in winter, and the wind comes from across Brooklyn, and I must work and live for my daughters; aren't they nice? I work very hard, and will keep it up until the girls grow up, and I have many old customers, some of them give me two, three, five dollars at a time."

As Mrs. Karp talked in spasmodic English and Yiddish, the children sat about her, and Mrs. Karp, after a moment, told them to go to school. She had just another gown and her years of hard work were not to have destroyed all of her attractiveness by any means.

And not only did Mrs. Karp have on a new gown, but she had a new watch with diamond rings and earrings which she had bought for a few hundred dollars. She had given two of her big rings set with many stones to her children, she said, and would soon give the others to them.
