CITY OUT \$2,176 IN TAXES BY FEW SCRATCHES OF PEN
A Look at Appeals Committee: More than is Rather Illuminating:—Somewhat Routine Proceeding But City Loses

The reports submitted by the appeals committee of the common council each month, if published in detail, might afford an interesting study for the citizen who pays his taxes. This committee consists of five members and each month they meet to hear the hard luck stories of citizens who feel that they are unjustly assessed as much as their burden of taxation is greater than they can bear, or they learn from men whose taxes have been allowed to run for a period of years that the accumulation is too heavy for them to liquidate. Thereupon the aldermen ask what is the best he can do and after "careful" consideration, decide that the entire indebtedness should be written off or that a nominal sum be accepted and the balance of arrears, ranging from \$3 to \$50 or possibly more, be struck from the books.

The report of the committee, setting forth the names and in most cases the amounts of the relief, is then made to the council and the report, almost invariably, is adopted without discussion.

It might be interesting for taxpayers to know that in the last three months, January, February and March meetings of the council, about eighty-five persons have been given relief for amounts varying from \$2 or \$3 up to \$75 or \$85. While in some cases, no doubt many cases, relief was deserved, yet it would appear from looking over the names that many who had large sums written off were unable to pay. It is known in one case, for instance that a man earning a good salary regularly throughout the year, was relieved of paying \$5, provided he paid the assessment for 1910. There might be cited other cases of persons who have been permitted to let their taxes run year after year and then appear before the appeals committee and have their taxes wiped out.

The reports of the committee do not always state the amount of relief given, but an idea of the revenue that is lost to the city in this manner may be gathered when it is stated that in the three last reports acted upon by the council, a total of \$2,176 was recommended to be written off, besides other amounts that were not specified in the reports.

"It is said that these cases may under the existing law be attacked. I am not a lawyer, but am informed that in case any individual separates man and wife, a civil case might be instituted and damages obtained, but this is of little value as it means a tedious and expensive lawsuit.
