fer terms to which I am wedded; that is the kind of better terms I have supported since I have been necessary. I have a kind of better terms I will continue to support when I am sent back to Ottawa by you for another five years." (Cheers.) There was no Conservative platform in this election, the minister declared. The Halifax platform had gone to pieces. In regard to this the liberal placed their faith in government control through the railway commission.

A White Man's Country.

Speaking of Asiatic immigration the minister said: "With Mr. Staples, I believe in British Columbia as a white man's country. (Loud cheer.) I do not think much political capital can be made out of this matter, because I am willing to accept the views of the Conservative friends that they have views on this subject as sound as mine, and they are a distinct improvement on the Oriental immigration as I am. Certainly for twenty-four years that I have lived in this province as a publisher, I have been a consistent and ardent supporter of a white man's country. (Applause.) Anything that has been done to keep Oriental out of the country is a credit to the Liberal government, just as it has been with labor legislation. We increased the head tax on Chinese and they have been kept out."

Mr. Staples—"The Chinese are coming in a thousand a month."

"They are not coming in one thousand a year," Mr. Templeman replied. "It must be understood that many of those who land here are in bond for Mexico and the States. For five years after the head tax was raised not one came in. The raising of the tax was not easy and was only accomplished because the government pushed it through. Public opinion in the East was much opposed to exclusion, but it is changing. With reference to the Japanese treaty, I must remind you that it gives Canada a distinct preference in the Japanese markets. We have the greatest advantage any country could have. There are very few Japanese coming here until recently, since the treaty some thousands came from Hawaii under conditions which you know. This is due to Mr. Lester's preference in the making of an agreement which limits to the smallest possible numbers the immigration of Japanese to this country. It is working in an entirely satisfactory manner."

"Mr. Borden told Mr. Cowan, the Conservative candidate in Vancouver, recently that if he was in power and Japan did not live up to the agreement he would cancel it. That is what Sir Wilfrid told the House last session, that as the future both parties are standing on the same platform in regard to the Japanese. There is a distinct preference in British Columbia, but as long as we remain part of the Empire we must consider Britain's offensive and defensive alliance with Japan. (Applause.)"

"The minister concluded by asking the electors to give him another term at Ottawa in order that he might finish the work to which he had his hand for the benefit of Victoria and the province as a whole.

Cheers for the minister closed the meeting.

CONSERVATIVE SPEAKER
ADVOCATES SECESSION

Solid Sixteen at Ross Bay Turn
Out to Greet Mr. Barnard.

Tuesday night was the coldest that has been experienced as yet this autumn and it was quite in keeping with the nature of things that there should have been a frost at Cramer's hall, Ross Bay. As a matter of fact, the weather was much more severe than that outside. The sixteen residents of that district who turned up to meet the Conservative candidate in the province on every occasion who went out to that corner of the city sat uneasily on hard benches, and six of them left before the meeting was over. Mr. Barnard himself found it impossible to endure the cold more than a few minutes after giving his talk, and he returned to the hall in a hurry.

T. Smith was chosen as chairman of the meeting. He explained that he was a milkman. He was a sort of endless chain of non-union labor. He had no special prerogatives he made a point of putting in a word for Mr. Barnard. He did not think the Conservative candidate would have a big majority, so they would need every vote.

The candidate, who was the first speaker, told in almost pathetic terms of his friendship for the chairman, which had existed for many years, almost as long as he could remember. He said that as he was elected to the chairmanship of the publication of the free more and more. He did not, he said, expect to convince old Liberals of the value of Conservatism, but he hoped that he could appeal to a younger generation with an open mind. For himself he was a dyed-in-the-wool Tory, and it would give a good deal to convert him to anything else.

Mr. Barnard then went on to claim that Hon. William Templeman had sacrificed the interests of the province on every important question. He had done this on the question of better terms. Mr. McBride had left the conference at Fredericton when he found he could not get what he wanted, and he, the speaker, commended him for that action. He claimed that Mr. Templeman had been obstructive in the province of securing better terms for the province. Mr. McBride had gone to the country on this issue and had done the same. He urged his hearers to do the same for himself, or all the other provinces would say that British Columbia did not care.

Turning to the question of Asiatic exclusion, the speaker said this was a question in which all were interested. Japan was an aggressive nation. Their country was overcrowded, and the people were ready to work for low wages. He then outlined the manner in which the treaty had entered into and blamed the Liberal government for not inserting a protective clause therein.

Mr. Barnard made as much as he could of the statement alleged to have been made by Mr. Borden that he stood for a white Canada, and at the same time tried to show that the Liberal government did not stand for that.

Mr. Barnard then turned to militia affairs. He blamed the government for an alleged reduction in the force at Work Point, claiming that it meant a loss to the community of \$50,000 a year.

This, however, did not arouse the enthusiasm and smiles passed over most of the faces present.

In conclusion, Mr. Cuthbert said he did not believe in any man being a mugwump, but he thought it would be right on this occasion for Liberals to support the Conservative candidate. In illustrating this point he turned to the question of Home Rule or Inclusion, which was being discussed brought in that measure his speaker's father had prophesied defeat. What happened then? asked Mr. Cuthbert. He replied that the Marquis of Hartington and Sir Michael Hicks Beach all left the Liberal ranks in the Home Rule campaign.

After passing words of thanks to the speakers, the little gathering adjourned.
