LOCAL NEWS.

He was not found until a couple of hours had elapsed from the time the accident had occurred. Collins had no particular business in the ship which is a funnel used for hoisting masts. Word from the hospital says that Collins is resting easily although badly injured.

A PRESENTATION

There was a presentation at Dipper Harbor a couple of weeks ago that pleased a large number of persons. J. DIDN'T CARE TO WORK OVER TIME

There is an old story of a hod carrier who was employed on a twenty-story New York building; he had a hod load of bricks on his shoulder and climbed up to the ladder until he reached the staging on the 20th story. IMPLICATED IN THE HAZELTON BARREL MYSTERY

HAZELTON, Pa., Dec. 18.—Sobrett Annals, a Slavonian living at Jeddah, Pa., was arrested in a coal mine at that place today on the charge of being implicated in the Hazelton barrel mystery. It is alleged that the woman whose charred remains were found here yesterday was his wife who disappeared from home several weeks ago. It is reported that the marriage of the couple, which took place a year ago, was opposed by their relatives and that after their wedding they had frequent quarrels. The description of the victim tallies with that of the missing woman.

NATIVE OF ST. JOHN DEAD IN FREDERICTON

FREDERICTON, N. B., Dec. 18.—The death occurred this morning at her residence, Charlotte street, of Ida Jane, relict of the late James S. Verrier, in the 75th year of her age, from congestion.
The deceased was a native of St. John and a daughter of the late John Hammond. She leaves no near relatives. The remains will be taken to St. John for burial. Mrs. Verrier was a lady possessed of considerable wealth and in a quiet way was a friend of the poor and given to charity.

HIS BODY WAS CREMATED

OAKLAND, Cal., Dec. 18.—The body of Sir John Long, Scottish member of parliament, who died at Monterey last Wednesday, was cremated Sunday. At his wish the ashes will be taken back to his native country.

RINK TROUBLE STILL UNSETTLED

Whole Trouble Left in the Hands of Col. White

Marathon Athletic Club Must Make Arrangements With Him—Letter from Minister—Roller Skating

It is not yet known whether the Marathon Athletic Club will be allowed the use of the Exhibition Building for hockey purposes. Since Col. White ordered that the club must not use the building affairs have been at a standstill.

Mayor Sears wrote a letter to Sir Frederick Borden, Minister of Militia, asking that the Marathons be allowed the use of the building. A letter has been received from the minister. He directs Mayor Sears on behalf of the Marathons to consult with Col. White. The matter has been left in his hands entirely. Col. White does not wish to settle the matter. He does not care to forbid the club to use the building, as he wishes to see every way to help them successful in sporting circles. As there are militia stores in the other portion of the building he finds it his duty, however, to look after their safety.


