

EFFICACY OF THE ALLIED ADVANCE

New York People Bring Back Tales of German Atrocities In France

New York, Oct. 11.—Accounts of German atrocities, detailed and horrible, were brought to New York Friday by many passengers on board the Lusitania, of the Cunard line, which arrived from Liverpool early in the morning with 533 persons in her first cabin accommodations and a total of 1,477 passengers in all classes. Most of the stories of experiences near or on the battlefields in France have come to this country second or third hand, and few of them have been the observations of experts in the art of war.

Such was not the case with Captain Le Vert Coleman, U. S. A., who was one of the officers detailed to duty on the Tennessee, which was sent to England with gold for the relief of American refugees. Captain Coleman was on the battle line of the allies during the battle of the Marne and in a position to observe the various moves of both invaders and defenders. He attributes the German retreat to the lack of food and ammunition and criticized their means of communication with their bases.

"Every Frenchman on the firing line and those in the rear," said Captain Coleman, "knows that he is fighting for his very existence and the German army never will again get so close to Paris as it has been. From what I observed the French light artillery is far superior to that of the German army, but the latter's cavalry, is much better than the French's."

Declares Atrocities Ordered.

Captain Coleman declared that the atrocities committed by the German soldiers did not result from cases of individual barbarism, but from orders promulgated from the highest officers in command of the invading forces.

"I have in my possession," he said, "the copy of a speech that was delivered by Kaiser Wilhelm in 1914 in which he declared that the next war would be one to the death, and he ordered his men to neither give nor accept quarter and to take no prisoners. I am told that this speech, or one of similar nature, was delivered to the soldiers at the beginning of this war."

Captain Coleman said that during the retreat of General von Kluck's army from its most advanced position, raiding parties of cavalry were turned to the scene of the larger rear guard actions and deliberately turned their machine guns on the wounded lying on the field, killing them to a man.

"One wounded French soldier," said the captain, "told me how these units would dismount and kick the dead and wounded. If a man or any movement followed this treatment the wounded man was shot summarily. The man who told me this had been kicked. He groaned and was shot but not mortally."

The action of the French troops under fire, Captain Coleman declared, was excellent. "They charged," he said, "with wonderful spirit, and I have seen them go into action knowing full well that only their number would return, but confident that their death list would only half that of the Germans."

William F. Corey, formerly head of the United States Steel Corporation, was also a passenger on board the Lusitania. He went aboard to rescue Mrs. Corey, who was in her French chateau at the beginning of the war. After great difficulty he brought her to Paris and thence to London where she remained.

Mr. Corey Foresees Long War.

"It is foolish to talk of peace now," he said. "A year from now will be time enough for that, for England is ready to fight to the last; France realizes that Germany must be crushed before she can conduct her affairs with freedom from the war cloud and Germany has food, clothing and ammunition enough for a war of two summers and one winter. After that I believe that the resources will have been completely drained."

"It is absurd to say that the United States will be benefited by the war. No country was ever benefited by a war, but we will fare better than any other nation."

Mr. Corey said that Italy's position in the present struggle rested on a peculiar foundation. He declared that if Italy were to remain neutral then Germany must foot the bills caused by the mobilization of the Italian army. If Germany refuses this Italy will cast her lot with the allies and take a chance on being indemnified at the end of the war.

LAST NIGHT'S WAR NEWS IN SUMMARY

Fall of Antwerp Followed by Occupation of Ghent, Report Says.

BERLIN SATISFIED WITH SITUATION.

Allies Continue to Extend Their Lines—London Will Not be Taken Unawares by Invasion of Enemy's Airships.

The occupation of Antwerp by the Germans has been followed, according to the latest reports, by the occupation of Ghent, which would seem to confirm the German plan, as it has already been outlined, of a movement towards the coast, with Ostend as its objective.

First hand information regarding the destruction of the Rheims cathedral came from Thomas Silldell, of New York, who brought back with him a fragment of one of the German shells that pierced the roof of the ancient edifice and several pieces of glass from the beautiful windows that were almost pulverized by the shrapnel bullets and concussion of explosion of shells. He declared that the cathedral could never be rebuilt, and that the outside walls are now standing. He also brought back a German helmet he picked up on the battlefield at Meaux. Inside it was an inscription in German—'Kettler, 9th Regiment.' That the one-time wearer was a soldier from Saxony also was indicated.

Another passenger was Barclay Warburton, inventor of a rapid fire gun that is used by the Allied armies. He was in Russia during the war, and declared that it had been carried on with a degree of organization equal to that of the German army.

"In a year Russia could put 40,000 men on a war footing," he said, "and every available man to the colors."

He said, "It would take that long to train and equip them, but it could be done and they would be efficient soldiers."

There was some criticism among the passengers of the speech made last Wednesday night by Representative George S. Graham, of Philadelphia, who denounced the Germans for their attitude in the war. In explaining his attitude to the reporters Mr. Graham said he had merely spoken of the destruction of the British cruisers, and said it was a pity that young men to be sacrificed to a military despot.

"When I was in Germany," Mr. Graham said, "I was literally deluged with speeches that were intended to impress me with the nobility of the German cause. I confess that I was impressed and believed that the Allied Powers might be in the wrong, but when I came to make a careful study of the diplomatic correspondence in the White Paper I found that Germany had violated the neutrality of Belgium, and that England had forced us on her."—N. Y. Herald.

RAILWAY DISPUTE GROWING MORE INTERESTING

Valley Railway Crew Succeeds in Putting in "Diamond" After Getting Obstructing C. P. R. Car Out of the Road.

Fredericton, Oct. 12.—The "battle of Aberdeen street" has been practically won by the invading forces who, in a midnight attack, stormed the C. P. R. line and put in their "diamond" and completed the crossing for the Valley Railway.

About two o'clock this morning the crossing was finished, but throughout the night there were almost constant recurring clashes between the forces of the two railway companies. The police were called out and officers were again on the scene of trouble today. At noon today the new line was intact for about half a mile on either side of the point where the two roads cross one another, and the laboring car is now with the C. P. R. who, it is asserted, must either allow the crossing to remain where it has been placed or show cause why it should be removed.

The midnight attack took place under the personal direction of Mr. Ross Thompson of the Valley Railway, who had returned on Saturday night from Montreal, where he had been in consultation with Mr. F. P. G. Stettin, general manager of the I. C. R.

The British and Belgian troops who retired from Antwerp before the German occupation, with the exception of those who are now interned in Dutch soil as a result of having had to cross the border, have been swallowed up as completely as if they had been buried under the ruined forts. For military reasons their positions, and the area of hostilities in Belgium, must remain obscure, until the turn of events bring them sharply to the fore again, as was the case when, after the fall of Antwerp, the British public learned, for the first time, that British forces had assisted the garrison.

The allies still hold the ground they claim to be regained, but the Germans are throwing more men westward, and are getting up a hard fight, and the communication does not make plain which side holds the town nearest the coast.

At two other points, notably between Arras and Oise, and on the right, in Vesges, it is said, the German attacks have been repulsed.

A Military Expert's Views on the Fall of Antwerp

Optimistic as always, the British press, besides contending that Antwerp is of no importance to Germany as a naval base, finds solace in the argument that the release of the allied troops there, more than counterbalances the troops which Germany will send from that point into France. Col. Frederick N. Maude, a retired army officer, and author of several standard military books, writes in today's Evening Standard, says:

"This morning finds the Belgians with five-sixths of the British contingent perfectly ready to renew the fight, with their supplies and reinforcements, from overseas as well as safeguarded. After deducting the necessary garrison for Antwerp, losses and so forth, it is exceedingly probable that the Germans have more than sixty thousand men left to follow them—which gives us a clear gain of forty thousand to our left wing, without counting the reinforcements which we shall pick up on the way."

The official communication from Paris, indicated how this left wing is stretching daily and will soon reach the coast. If the opposing sides continue to throw out cavalry in an endeavor to outflank or break through, the allies make no claim to victory in the afternoon statement, which says that the German advance in the west and east as far north as Hazebrouck, a point hardly more than a good day's walk from Calais.

When the allies claimed yesterday that they had driven the Germans from Arras, London learned for the first time that the Germans had made much progress west of Arrantieres, which they reached last week. Presumably

Puzzling Report Concerning Antwerp.

A paragraph near the end of the official communication, saying it is understood that the Germans are occupying only the suburbs of Antwerp, has been received on persons living near the mouth of the Thames that they should be ready to seek their cellars at the first sound of firing, as there will be no time to spread the news in any more formal way.

Recruiting throughout Great Britain, particularly in London, has been booming, it is said, since the fall of Antwerp, the talk of the Germans advancing from Berlin by the Marcon Wireless Telegraph Company.

"Enormous quantities of provisions of all kinds were captured in Antwerp. The garrison of the northern forts and 18,000 English fled to Holland, where they were disarmed. The British themselves are said to have blown up ten of the Antwerp forts. The Belgians estimate that they lost 20,000 men as prisoners. When the fall of Antwerp was made known to the allies the French cavalry was withdrawn in the direction of Arras."
