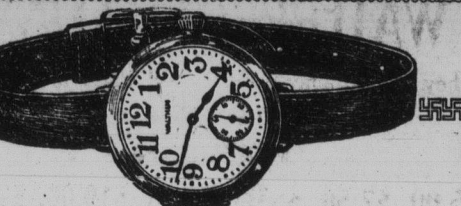

MOVEMENT TO RE-ORGANIZE PROVINCIAL BOY SCOUTS

New Brunswick Council Holds Annual Meeting at Fredericton—Life Saving Medal for Walter Allen of St. John Who Dived from Wharf.

Ottawa, Aug. 10.—Sir Robert Borden left this afternoon to spend the weekend at Hon. Dr. Reid's summer home on the St. Lawrence, and get a much needed rest. He looks tired out. With his departure political excitement of the last two days, which was occasioned by the now famous Rideau Hall conference, subsided and there will be no new developments until after his return next week.

That there will be a reorganization of the cabinet is certain, and there is still a strong probability that it will include some prominent Liberals, although Sir Wilfrid Laurier has refused the second offer of the premier to join with him in the formation of a Union Government. The offer made by Sir Robert to certain Liberals to enter his government is still open and the time is approaching when an announcement will be made.

Rowell May Enter.

With regard to Mr. N. W. Rowell, leader of the opposition in Ontario, it is understood that he is willing to enter the government provided he has the assurance that he has a strong body of Liberal opinion in the province behind him.

His action upon the matter will depend upon this.

The Western convention at Winnipeg has had one notable result. It has brought to the government an unexpected flood of correspondence and messages from many parts of the country, particularly from Ontario, conveying the assurance that the tide of public opinion is flowing strongly in favor of conscription. There is now absolutely no doubt that Ontario will give the government a tremendous support. It is fully expected that only two anti-conscriptionists will be returned by this province.

St. Stephen, Aug. 10.—At a late hour this afternoon a collision between an automobile and a freight train occurred on the C. P. R. crossing on the Valley Road just at the outskirts of the town. Mr. and Mrs. Waldo P. Lowell of Calais were returning from a visit to St. John. It was raining hard and the sides of the car were all closed in and as the car approached the crossing the outward bound freight train and realizing that it was sometime before the crossing just as a freight train was going out. The engine struck their car which was badly wrecked condition. Mr. Lowell escaped uninjured, but Mrs. Lowell was not so fortunate and was unconscious when the train hands reached her. She was placed in the caboose of the train and brought to town and taken at once to Chipman Memorial Hospital where later it was found that she had escaped with a dislocated hip and some bruises.

That the accident did not have a fatal termination was due to the fact that the trainmen had seen the approaching car in time to greatly slacken the speed of the train before the collision.

AN ORDER PLACED FOR THREE THOUSAND GUNS

American Brake, Shoe and Foundry Co. Gets \$60,000,000 Government Contract.

New York, Aug. 10.—Slight reactions occurred in the steel group during the early afternoon with B. S. B. regaining its own. Unfilled tonnage of U. S. Steel Corporation showed a loss of over half a million tons, which cannot be attributed to lack of demand, but rather to non-acceptance of orders with books filled to overflowing combined with hesitancy to make commitments pending government price adjustments.

One of the biggest munition orders ever placed with a single company by the U. S. government has been closed with the Amn. Brake Shoe and Foundry Co. The order is for three thousand and six hundred guns. Amount involved in the contract is not known but \$60,000,000 would probably be a conservative estimate.
