

GOV'T WILL MEET DEMANDS OF WEST

Believed That a Promise Will Be Forthcoming at the Thursday Caucus.

Ottawa, March 17.—The government will meet the demands of the west for tariff reductions by a promise of a complete revision of the tariff within the next year was a suggestion heard here this morning. By some, will be made at the caucus to be held on Thursday at which tariff matters will be exclusively discussed. A promise of tariff revision would be in addition to any immediate reduction the government may be willing to make, and which might possibly include the removal of the seven and a half per cent. general increase, imposed on war revenue measure.

GERMAN EMPIRE TO COME BACK

Former Foreign Minister Thinks It Will Be Resurrected More Rapidly Than Most People Think.

Paris, March 17.—The German empire will be resurrected more rapidly than most people think, Mr. Richard von Kuehlmann, former German foreign minister, declares in a letter quoted by the Echo de Paris. According to the letter, von Kuehlmann says that the former ruler classes of Germany are still hopeful of retaining power.

The letter says that events are moving as the writer anticipated earlier in the year when he wrote that the Reich had breathed its sword and it would not be necessary for Germany to fear France longer. Under favorable conditions, von Kuehlmann is quoted as saying, the Germans will be in Paris before 1921.

EMPEROR WAS ALWAYS POSTED

Former German Chancellor Declares That His Reports Always Described the Situation to the Emperor as it Appeared.

Copenhagen, March 17.—Dr. von Bethmann-Hollweg, former German Imperial Chancellor, in defending himself against the accusation of Herr Scheilmann, the foreign editor of the Berlin Kreuzzeitung, that his reports were distorted, declared that his reports and those of the foreign secretary always described the situation in the most accurate manner possible.

He said that the Emperor, as it appeared from the entire material at their disposal. The Berlin despatch, which carries this statement from the ex-Chancellor, quotes him as saying: "At no time was the Emperor left in doubt regarding the danger of opposing the Emperor, and every year the increasing gravity of the situation was impressed upon him."
