

SINN FEINERS ARE WILLING TO PAY OLD DEBT TO U. S.

This Promise Made on Condition of Securing New Loan from the Big Financiers.

New York, June 26.—If an Irish republic is established it will assume full responsibility for the \$500,000 Fenian bond issue, as yet unpaid, which was floated in the United States in 1866, on behalf of Ireland's cause. It was announced here today by Eamon DeValera, Sinn Fein leader, who said he regarded these bonds as a debt of honor. Details for the payment were now being arranged to be associated with the loan issue which the Sinn Feiners are hoping to float in this country.

"We acknowledge the indebtedness of the Irish nation," Mr. DeValera said.

"The payments would be met out of the new bond issues, the notes of which would be exchanged for the old bonds."

DEWART HEADS ONT. LIBERALS

Elected Leader of the Party in Provincial Legislature, Defeating Major Talmie.

Toronto, June 26.—Hartley Dewart, K. C., M. P. P., for South Toronto, was today elected leader of the Liberal party in the Provincial Legislature, in succession to William Proudfoot, K. C. Mr. Dewart secured 158 votes out of a total of 312, on the second ballot. Major Talmie, M. P. P., for Windsor was second choice. He received 121 votes on the second ballot.

GERMAN MANAGERS OF STEEL PLANTS SENT TO PRISON

Failed to Deliver Shells and Shell Forgings to Army of Occupation.

Coblentz, June 26.—(By The Associated Press).—Sentences imposed upon Julius Mayer and Hugo Oehler, managers of the German Steel Works near Prum, within the occupied area, were approved today by Lieut-General Hunter Liggett, commander of the Army of Occupation. The men were convicted on charges of failing to deliver to the American forces 300,000 shells and shell forgings. They were sentenced to six months imprisonment and a fine of 10,000 marks each by a military commission.

RED CROSS IS AIDED BY AMERICAN NAVY TO FEED BOSNIANS

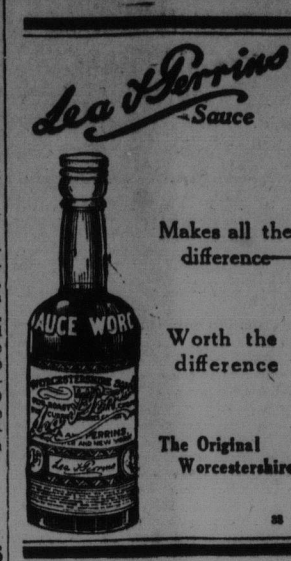
Yankee Sailors Fraternize With Czech-Slovaks and Provide Care for Boatload of Men from Vladivostok.

Spalato, Bosnia, April 26. Via Paris, May 10 (By Mail).—Rear Admiral Albert P. Niblack, who is in charge of the American naval forces in the Adriatic, is stationed at this point. News from Plume reaches here quickly and Admiral Niblack maintains close wireless contact, both with Washington and Paris. Developments in the Adriatic are being closely watched by the American naval authorities.

The American Navy for humanitarian reasons is giving all the assistance possible to the American Red Cross and Major Lawrence of the army food mission in their efforts to supply the destitute and starving of Bosnia and the Jugo-Slav state with medicines, food and clothing.

There have been difficulties with the Italian authorities in securing permission for American food supplies to enter the Jugo-Slav state, but recently a dozen motor trucks loaded with medicines, food and clothing reached Jugo-Slavia and their contents have been distributed by the American Red Cross.

American sailors fraternize with the Czech-Slovaks and both the American Red Cross and the army food mission recently made up a special shipment of food and medicines and sent a special commission of doctors and nurses

to care for the boatload of Czech-Slovak soldiers who recently came home from Colombo and Vladivostok after a voyage half way around the world.

Admiral Niblack strongly urged the American Red Cross to enter Spalato with relief shipments and on his recommendation Colonel Henry W. Anderson, of Richmond, Va., Balkan Commissioner of the American Red Cross, has instructed his Bosnia representatives to rush supplies into Spalato and the mountainous districts beyond it.
