BENNY LEONARD DEFENDED HIS TITLE AGAINST ROCKY KANSAS

World's Lightweight Champion Won from Buffalo Fighter in Madison Square Garden Before 15,000 Persons — Went Fifteen Rounds to a Decision.

New York, Feb. 10.—Benny Leonard, world's lightweight boxing champion, retained his title tonight by receiving the judge's decision over Rocky Kansas at the end of their fifteen round bout in Madison Square Garden.

The champion worked slowly and his blows appeared to have little effect during the early rounds. In these rounds Kansas appeared to have a little the better of the exchanges. In the seventh round Leonard's blows were truer and from then on he landed as he pleased and took few blows in return.

In the eleventh round, following an interchange of body blows Leonard caught the challenger on the point of the jaw, with a left hook and Kansas went down for a count of nine.

Four rounds, the first four of the bout, went to Kansas; the fifth and sixth were even and the others, the champion's.

Kid McPartland, veteran former lightweight, refereed the contest. Benny Leonard, world's light weight champion, tonight defended his title against Rocky Kansas, of Buffalo. Both men entered the ring at 10 p. m. Leonard's weight at 130 pounds, Kansas weighed in at 135. Madison Square Garden held a capacity crowd of 15,000 persons.

Fight by Rounds
Round one—They sparred for a moment and Leonard tapped the challenger on the nose with a light left. Kansas missed two left hooks for the jaw. Leonard took a light left on the nose. Kansas missed a hard left swing for the head and then sent a left to the body, followed with another left to the jaw. The challenger was forcing the fighting.
Round two—The champion boxed cautiously and took a hard left to the face. He shot a right hook to the challenger's jaw. Kansas sent over a straight left to the nose and a short right to the body. Leonard blocked two left swings for the head. They were in a clinch at the bell. Leonard bit at the mouth.
Round three—Leonard sent a straight left to the nose. Kansas missed two right swings and a right uppercut. Leonard sent his left to Rocky's head three times and missed a right hook. The champion outboxed the challenger in this round but his punches were light.
Round four—Both missed rights to the head. Kansas sent hard rights to Leonard's body and in a clinch they exchanged right uppercuts. Leonard's nose was bleeding. Kansas missed repeatedly in punching for the body. Leonard sent a hard right to the challenger's jaw.
Round five—Kansas using a back handed punch with his left caught Leonard's jaw twice. They had an even exchange of rights at close quarters. Leonard sent straight right to jaw and left to body. They were sparring at the bell.
Round six—Both men worked quickly. Leonard landed a sharp right hook on the challenger's jaw. Kansas took three straight lefts on the nose and returned one.
Round seven—They fought at close quarters but landed few effective blows. Leonard then sent a series of hooked lefts to the chin. Leonard blocked most of the challenger's punches. They were in a hard exchange of rights and lefts to head and body at the bell.
Round eight—Leonard's blows were finding their mark in this round. He followed a hard left to the body with two right hooks to the jaw. Kansas sent short lefts to the chin.
Round nine—Leonard sent a series of straight lefts to the chin and jaw. Leonard sent a hard left hook to the jaw. Leonard shook up the challenger with right uppercuts at close quarters. The champion appeared in his best form in this round.
Round ten—Kansas missed a left swing and took a left to the jaw. Kansas sent a straight left to the jaw. Leonard landed a left and then right hook. Leonard sent two straight lefts to the body. Kansas countered with right to the body.
Round eleven—Kansas went down under a stiff left hook to the jaw, but was up at the count of nine. Leonard sent hard blows to the body, but Kansas managed to last the round.
Round twelve—Leonard landed his left at will, but they were tight as he was looking for an opening for a right. Leonard sent his left to the challenger's chin and jaw repeatedly, but Kansas appeared to have recovered from the eleventh round knock-down.
Round thirteen—Leonard landed short rights and lefts to the body. Leonard sent hard right to the stomach. Leonard sent three lefts to the challenger's face. He cautioned Kansas against hitting low.
Round fourteen—Leonard sent lefts to body and rights to the head. Leonard sent sharp lefts to the chin. Kansas wined under a left to his stomach. Leonard landed a sharp left to the chin at the bell.
Round fifteen—Leonard rocked the challenger with rights and lefts to the chin. Leonard landed straight right to the jaw. Leonard sent right to the chin and followed with right upper-

Fast Racing At Lake Placid

Steinmetz Won 440, Gorman Third — Three — Quarter Event to Jewtraw—Tebbo Gets Place.

Lake Placid, Feb. 10.—William Steinmetz, of Chicago, virtually clinched the title of amateur skating ace of America late today by winning the 440 yards dash and finishing second in the three-quarter mile race, the second day events on the card of the diamond trophy championship. He now has a total of 110 points. Charles Jewtraw, of Lake Placid comes next with 55 points.

In order for Steinmetz to lose the title, Jewtraw would have to win both the half and three mile races tomorrow, and the Chicago man fall to get a place.

Richard Donovan, of St. Paul, tonight led the silver cup contenders by ninety points. His nearest competitor is Paul Foreman, of New York, who has only thirty points.

The diamond trophy events today were more spectacular than yesterday, both being sharply contested. As in the 320 yards dash yesterday, Steinmetz gave the spectators an unexpected thrill by winning.

At the start Jewtraw took a big lead and held it for the first lap. Gorman then closed in on him and it appeared to be a fight between these two. Suddenly at the stretch Steinmetz flashed past the leaders and streaked across the finish line a winner. McWhirter was fourth and Moore fifth.

In the three-quarter mile race, Moore took the lead at the bell lap and for a moment it looked as though he would win without much contest. In the back stretch, however, Jewtraw quickened his pace, fought it out with Moore to the turn, and then came down the stretch in the lead. Steinmetz moved into second place, with Moore third. McWhirter and Gorman both fell at the last turn and slid on the course.

Donovan gave a brilliant exhibition in the half-mile race. At the last lap he was poked, but fought his way to third place and then, as the skaters came down the stretch, he breast dove through to the finish. William Murphy, of New York, was second, and Valentine Blasius, of Lake Placid, third.

In the mile event Donovan took the lead at the bell and never was headed. Fred Buenger, of Chicago, finished second, and Herman Perleberg, of Cleveland, came third.

Jewtraw's work of winning the three quarter mile race and finishing second in the 440 yards dash boosted him into second place.

Joe Ford, of New York, who finished third in the three quarter mile race is third with forty points.

Roy McWhirter, of Chicago, is fourth with 25 points scored yesterday.

Charles Gorman of St. John, N. B., tonight had only ten points, secured today, when he finished third in the 440 yard dash.
