

# CT OF AN BANDIT

## Forced 50 Men Into Burning Tunnel

### Nine American Railway Employees Among the Victims

#### Took Terrible Revenge On Villa for Executing Twenty-two of His Band—Outlaw Has Been a Terror to the Country for a Long Time.

Juarez, Mexico, Feb. 7.—The nine Americans and forty or fifty Mexicans whose fate has been a mystery since the destruction of the Cumbre tunnel last Wednesday, were suffocated. This information was received here this evening from the headquarters of the Mexican revolutionary railroad. The tragedy is said to have taken place at the mouth of the tunnel about 300 feet and the dead bodies were found there.

Railroad men here and in El Paso are anxious at Castillo's act. On Tuesday twenty-two of his men were captured and executed by the rebels and the next day, apparently in revenge, he captured a freight train, ran it into the south end of the tunnel about 300 feet and there set fire to it.

The passenger train entered the death tunnel from the north, travelling at its normal rate of about fifteen miles an hour. When the engineer discovered the trap he tried to stop the train, but Castillo's men succeeded in sending back warnings of his deed regarded as the most cruel and murderous act of his career of outlawry, and there is a disposition here to believe that General Francisco Villa for not having crushed him long ago.

# TO BUILD ADDITION TO SANITARIUM

## Mr. Brodie Calls for Tenders for Another Building at River Glade—To Begin Work Soon.

Tenders are invited by F. Nell Brodie for the construction of an additional building at the Jordan Memorial Sanitarium, River Glade, for the accommodation of free patients, the cost of which will be borne entirely by Mrs. Brodie.

The building will be two stories in height, forty feet wide and 100 feet long. It will contain a kitchen, a dining room, a recreation room, ten feet wide, of which will be enclosed with glass to form sun rooms, will run along the entire front and part of the rear of the building.

This new addition to the sanitarium will be placed about 250 yards from the administration building. The main entrance, which is to be at the end, will be a two-story veranda, ten feet wide, of which will be enclosed with glass to form sun rooms, will run along the entire front and part of the rear of the building.

The second floor will be practically a duplicate of the ground floor. The building will be heated throughout by steam piped from a power house about 800 feet distant, where is also generated the electricity required for lighting, etc.

The plumbing appliances will be of the best and best hospital use. The walls and ceilings will be finished with natural finish. The doors, casings, etc., are to be of cypress and Douglas fir in natural finish.

Fire protection will be afforded by equipping each floor with a two and a half inch stand pipe, swinging hose reels and fifty feet of hose, the stand pipe being connected with the water system of the institution which is supplied on a 20,000 gallon tank on a sixty feet tower.

Work will be begun at once and is to be completed by May 30.

### CUTTING OF PRICES ON PATENT MEDICINES

Brand New Trust by Combination of Drug Stores is Alleged

Washington, Feb. 9.—Small manufacturers and dealers who compete with great corporations want some provision for price regulation in the new trust bill to prevent their being succeeded when they cannot meet prices on large quantities.

Before the senate interstate commerce committee a delegation spoke against a clause which provides that nothing in the bill should "prevent discrimination in prices between purchasers or commodities on account of differences in grade, quality or quantity of the commodity sold, or that makes only due allowance for difference in the cost of transportation."

The advent of a brand-new "trust" was announced by a delegation from the National Association of Retail Druggists.

C. H. Nixon told the home commerce committee that cutting prices on patent medicines is the chief use by a combination of drug stores and cigar stores to drive small independent retailers out of business.

"We believe a monopoly is being started," he said, "with the object of controlling the retail drug trade of the entire United States."

### FOOD PRICES IN

#### U. S. ARE LOWER

#### Butter and Eggs Cheap and Will Be Cheaper

Several Foreign Countries Are Shipping These Products to New York in Large Quantities, and Merchants Have Been Forced to Give the Consumer the Benefit.

(New York Evening Post.)

At least two table necessities—butter and eggs—which only a few weeks ago were away up in price, are much cheaper today. They are thought of being at this time of year, and they are going to be cheaper still, according to local marketmen.

The reason given down in Washington, where the best butters are produced, is that they are being brought to this country in large quantities from Russia and Germany by the sea route.

With imports flooding the market with these foreign-made and laid products, wholesalers have been obliged to make big cuts in the prices of the home-made articles. Butter has dropped from forty-two to thirty-three cents, retail, and eggs from fifty and even sixty to thirty-seven cents, retail. And the best is yet to come, the marketmen say.

### WILL CONTINUE THEIR "EVIL" WAYS

#### P. E. I. Provincial Alliance Decides to Buy Rum to Convince the Sellers

#### A LIVELY SESSION

A Few Members Protest Against Doing Wrong That Good May Come—Should Conduct Liquor Crusade on a Higher Plane Than Hiring Spotters.

Charlottetown, P. E. I., Feb. 6.—The executive of the provincial alliance met this morning and discussed plans of future work. It is understood since the employment of detectives was endorsed at their annual meeting yesterday that this policy will be followed, if sufficient funds are forthcoming.

Three thousand dollars are needed for next year and already \$2,000 is pledged in Charlottetown, one wealthy for man contributing \$100.

At yesterday morning's session ex-Prosecutor Jenkins found fault with the alliance for relating to give spotters, sentenced to six months' imprisonment without the option of a fine, their freedom, on condition that they would not be employed by the alliance.

Some interesting facts were brought to light during the discussion in the evening over a resolution approving of the active employment of spotters, one of the most active members of the alliance, John Anderson, of Charlottetown, who had just returned from a tour of inspection in Ontario.

Several other speakers took the ground that the alliance should not afford to be squeamish about the matter. They must not be too particular about means used in destroying skinkers or reticent.

One minority speaker, who was not present at the meeting, stated that he was nothing short of an insult to oppose their methods on ethical grounds.

Another speaker said that if the government did not stick out the officials in their own homes, they should have taken the liquor to some other place and sampled it.

### BRIEFS FOR POULTRYMEN.

The scarcity of eggs and the corresponding high prices may be a temptation for some to give a stimulating food to their stock, which will be used as brooders next spring. Don't do it. It is the surest way of cutting down the fertility and impairing the hatchability.

Another thing which will affect the fertility is the too liberal feeding of green feed and green crops. Feed in moderation and be sure to feed one whole wheat and bread, which will give the hen will have to work hard for every grain. This method will stimulate egg production.

Remember that egg shells are composed largely of mineral matter, and oyster or clam shells must be supplied that the hen may do her best.

### TO BRING HOME

#### MANAGERS TO NEW BRUNSWICK

#### Gipsy Chief on Way to West for 140 of His People—Says He Will Return With Them to This Province.

(Montreal Star.)

Dobek, with shepherd's crook, and white bearded like the patriarch he is, is the king of the gypsies in Canada. Dobek was at the immigration quarters in the Windsor street station yesterday, for although few members of his tribes ever leave Canada, he has to watch over their wanderings, on very modern railway trains between Edmonton and New Brunswick.

Today Dobek, who maintains that he has no other name and refused to give any English designation for himself, is already since Feb. 1, 1913, six or seven hundred members of the gypsy clans are bringing them down to the sea provinces for the rest of the winter.

Every year this migratory people changes its habits several times, and indeed many of the little gypsy groups spend the entire year with never more than three or four days in a single town.
