Vandalism is rampant at Malton, Lorne Park

Two of the town's three Centennial libraries, opened last October, have been subjected to vandalism on their premises.

The Clarkson-Lorne Park Library and the Malton Public Library have had windows broken, break-ins, books taken and flags stolen. The third library in Lakeview has been left virtually unscathed with the exception of a few cracked windows before it opened.

The three new libraries were opened in October. They look very much alike and are built on similar designs. The hardest hit library is the Clarkson-Lorne Park, located near Lorne Park Secondary School. Several of the build-

ing's back windows have holes and cracks caused by BB pellets. The library was broken into three weeks ago and all the petty cash was stolen. Vandals armed with paint tins covered several of the walls with obscenities that workman had trouble removing even with sandblasting.

The library has also had its new flag taken right off the flag pole and several signs inside the
