ALLAN GILMOUR'S DEATH. Well-known Ottawa Lumberman Shoots Himself.

Ottawa, May 20. - Mr. Allan Gilmour, aged 57, a member of one of the oldest and most respected lumbering firms in the Ottawa Valley, met with a sudden and shocking death yeswith a sudden and shocking death yesterday. In some unexpected way while handling a loaded gun the weapon went off, and the bullet, entering behind Mr. Gilmour's right ear, blew the top of his head completely off. The body was found in the attic of the residence at 270 Gilmour street this afternoon about 4,30 by Mrs. Gilmour on returning from a walk. The deceased gentleman had luncheon with his wife and her niece, Miss Ethel Hendry of Kingston, after which Mr. Gilmour went up stairs to the attic, saying that he wanted to fix some fishing trip. Mrs. Gilmour and her niece went for a stroll, and did not return until about 4,30. What occurred to Mr. Gilmour subsequently is largely a matter of presumption. It is known, however, that he telephoned to the residence of his brother, who is ailing, asking if he could see visitors. He also went up town and called at Duries Chambers, but returned almost immediately. There was no undue excitement in his manner, and nothing to indicate that his mind was in any way upset. When Mrs. Gilmour and her niece got back from their walk they noticed Mr. Gilmour's hat on the hall rack, and were attracted by the actions of a favorite dog, which was running up and down stairs whining. Mrs. Gilmour ascended to the attic, and there discovered the corpse of her husband. Dr. J. F. Kidd was summoned, and gave it as his opinion that Mr. Gilmour had been dead for some time, In some unexpected way

LAND PAYS FOR RAILWAY. Legislature Passes Nearly a Million

Toronto, May 20. - The Legislature spent a busy day yesterday on general business, a good deal of progress being made, with little evidence of opposition. evening no less than \$933,378 was voted in supply, including the large items of public buildings and charges on Crown lands, which included \$100,000 for new surveys. Mr. Latchford introduced bill amending the Temiskaming Rail-way act, and providing for the setting way act, and providing for the setting apart of 20,000 acres per male to pay for the construction of the road. In supply Col. Gibson, in reply to Col. Matheson, made a statement respecting the difficulty of enforcing the law against the poolroom at Toronto Junction and the prize fights at Fort Erie.

To-day the House will deal with general bills, and will probably not sit in the evening.

Colonel Gibson said that while the matter was scarcely relevant, he would say they were doing their best to eradicate the evil complained of at Toronto Junction. It was a very difficult matter to deal with. A prosecution had just taken place and failed. The trouble with the Fort Erie institution was more the result of a weakness in the criminal law, for which this Government was not responsible, than from any want of assiduity or energy in administering the law. Very peremptory instructions had been given that no breach of the law should be permitted and although it was unsatisfactory to know that performances were given there which were prohibited in Buffalo, still we could not do more than enforce the law. If the criminal code was unequal to meet the case this Government was not responsible. The difficulty was in distinguishing between a prize fight and a boxing or sparring match, though the surroundings were about as bad in either case. Recently, having himself observed that an event was to take place at Fort Erie, he had given peremptory instructions that there should be no winking at the enforcing of the law. What had taken p ace he was not aware. The question was whether there should not be more peremptorymore searching legislation at Ottawa on this subject.

BANK VAU: T CLOSED.

Officials of the Reval Bank of Canada at Halifax Put to Great Inconvenience-Bank of Montreal Buys a Nova Scotia Bank.

Halifax, May 20.-For over thirtysix hours half a million dollars in gold and bills has reposed in the vault of the Royal Bank of Canada in this city beyond the reach of the officials of the institution. The combination of the beyond the reach of the officials of the institution. The combination of the vault door became deranged when the door was closed on Saturday night, and it has baffled the most expert locksmiths in Halifax to adjust it. Today efforts were made to drill through the door, but these too failed, and to-night workmen are engaged in tearing down the brick walls. All this time the bank has been forced to borrow funds from the Bank of Nova Scotia to carry on its business, and the drawers and acceptors of notes and drafts are obliged to defer payment until the vault is opened and the papers secured.

The Bank of Montreal has concluded an agreement tor the purchase of the Exchange Bank of Yarmouth, paying eighty dollars a share for the stock, the par value of which is seventy dollars. This will give the Bank of Montreal a foothold in western Nova Scotia, and enable it to keep pace in the Maritime Provinces with the Canadian Bank of Commerce which recently acquired the Halifax Banking Company.
