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## THE AMERICA'S CUP.

Dates of the Races for its Possession Since the Year 1851.

The America's cup has been held in the United States fifty-two years. It was won by the schooner yacht America Aug. 22, 1851, which defeated a fleet of British boats in British waters in a race around the Isle of Wight. Aurora, the yacht which finished second in that historic contest did not arrive at the finishing line until eighteen minutes after America had crossed a victor. In only one series of contests has a British boat succeeded in winning a race. This

The only living member of the America's crew event took place in 1871, when the challenger, Livonia, finished first in the third race of the series with Columbia.
