EGANVILLE, ONT.—The Council may purchase a stone crusher.

SPRINGHILL, N. S.—Jude Guild will build a new hotel here.

GLACE BAY, N. S.—A new Presbyterian church will be erected here.

ROSENFELDT, MAN.—Tenders will shortly be invited for erection of new school here.

GEORGETOWN, ONT.—Fred Thompson intends building a residence this season.

MANITOWANING, ONT.—The Episcopalians purpose building a manse this summer.

WOODSTOCK, N. B.—Donald Munro will receive tenders up to May 6th for remodelling town hall.

LADYSMITH, B. C.—It is understood that the Ladysmith Lumber Co. will extend their saw mill.

EDMONTON, N. W. T.—It is reported that another large hotel to cost \$50,000 will be built here.

KINGSVILLE, ONT.—Harry Chitwick will about June 1st commence the erection of a blacksmith shop, with concrete walls and floors.

SHERBROOKE, QUE.—Plans have been completed for alterations to the Academy building and tenders will likely be invited this week.

BARRIE, ONT.—E. Donnell, town treasurer, will receive bids up to May 2nd for purchase of five lots of 4 per cent. debentures, amounting to \$25,535.

BLENHHEIM, ONT.—The village clerk has been instructed to advertise for tenders for construction of drain and for debentures for same purpose.

VICTORIA, B. C.—It has been resolved to engage a local architect to design the proposed Carnegie library. A selection will be made this week.

HICKSVALE, N. W. T.—J. J. W. Bell will receive tenders up to May 15th for erection of a stone church. Plans by A. M. Fraser, architect, of Indian Head.

AMHERSTBURG, ONT.—The management of the Lake Erie & Detroit River Railway are considering the extension of the road from Harrow to this place.

INDIAN HEAD, N. W. T.—H. H. Campkin is asking for tenders up to May 15th for construction of a drain and for supply of the necessary pipe and material.

SAULT STE. MARIE, ONT.—Jas. Thomson, architect, has prepared plans for a residence to be built on Pim street hill by C. F. Farwell, estimated cost \$9,000.

SIMCOE, ONT.—A by-law to raise \$2,920 to assist the Simcoe Mitt, Glove and Robe Co. to establish a factory here will be submitted to the ratepayers on May 26th.

LINDSAY, ONT.—Thos. McConnell will, it is reported, erect a summer hotel on Jackson's Island, in Sturgeon Lake. An electric light plant may be installed in the hotel.

VANCOUVER, B. C.—A. F. Barber has submitted to the council of North Vancouver a proposition to install an electric plant for street and commercial purposes.

TORONTO JUNCTION, ONT.—Plans are being prepared for the buildings to be erected by the Canadian Packing and Provision Co. The works will be large.

GRANBY, QUE.—The council may purchase a steam fire engine.—A movement is on foot to secure the erection on Main street of a first-class hotel, to cost about \$30,000.

STRATFORD, ONT.—The permanent improvements on Downie, Huron, Ontario and Mornington streets will be done by day labor, under the direction of the city engineer.

COATICOOK, QUE.—The Council have offered the Coaticook Electric Light Co. \$30,000 for their plant. If this is not accepted a municipal plant may be installed.

MIDLAND, ONT.—The town clerk will receive offers up to 8 p. m. of 30th inst., for supply of a 2,000 light alternating current generator.

GRAVENHURST, ONT.—The by-law to raise \$30,000 for purchase of the existing electric light plant and permanent improvements and extensions thereto will be voted on May 11th.

MINNEDOSA, MAN.—Building here promises to be brisk. S. Fairbank will erect a brick veneer block, Dr. Andrew a residence, and the Methodist congregation a parsonage.

SMITH'S FALLS, ONT.—Tenders will be received by G. F. McKim up to 5 p. m. 30th inst. for erection of public library building here. Plans by G. M. Bayly, architect, of Ottawa.

BRANTFORD, ONT.—G. W. Hall, architect, is taking tenders for installation of a steam heating apparatus in the office of the Brantford Courier, also for alterations and additions to the building.

WINCHESTER, ONT.—Dunn & Fullerton, civil engineers, will receive tenders up to May 4th for the construction of a race track for the Winchester Township Agricultural Society.

WINDSOR, N. S.—J. C. Gelbert, town clerk, has given notice that the specifications for the Windsor hospital have been amended and the time for receiving tenders extended to May 1st.

ST. CATHARINES, ONT.—An additional grant has been received towards the erection of the Carnegie library, and it has been decided to proceed with the erection of the building, which will be of Roman stone.

SYDNEY, N. S.—The County Council have under consideration the building of a new asylum.—Park, Blackwell & Co., of Toronto, have had plans prepared for a branch of their pork-packing establishment to be built here.

FORT WILLIAM, ONT.—B. McDonald will build a residence on Regent street.—Mr. Woodhead has purchased property, corner of Syndicate avenue and Ridgeway street, on which he will build a brick residence.

YARMOUTH, N. S.—The installation of a larger dynamo for the electric light plant is under consideration by the town council.—Tenders will be received by C. Cooper for erection of a combined freight and passenger station for the Halifax & Yarmouth Railway Co.

ST. JOHN'S, N. B.—Plans have been prepared by Architect McKeen for remodelling St. Malachi's school.—Extensive improvements are to be made to St. Peter's church, north end.—Superintendent Osborne, of the C. P. R., has submitted to the city council plans for the rebuilding of the burned sheds at Sand Point and for other harbor improvements on the west side.

PETERBORO, ONT.—E. J. Philip, of Toronto, has been engaged by the town council to report upon the best street lighting system.—The Canadian General Electric Co. will give out contracts immediately for erection of several new buildings.—The Peterboro Sugar Co. have purchased the Howden property, comprising 34 acres, on which to build the proposed factory.

FREDERICTON, N. B.—The city council are about to call for tenders for electric lighting of the city.—A bill is now before the New Brunswick Legislature providing for an expenditure of \$20,000 on surface sewerage.—A bill has been presented to the Legislature for the incorporation of the Electro-Manganese Co., the object of which is to establish an extensive reduction plant at Grand Falls, on the St. John river. The capital stock is \$1,500,000. Barnhill & Sandford, of St. John, are solicitors for the company.
