London, Monday, May Times this morning relates the course of the South Africa peace negotiations as follows-On the receipt of the Dutch correspondence, intimating that Great Britain was ready to listen to proposals of Boers in the field. Actng President of the Transvaal Schalkberger and Mr. Steyn proposed to Lord Kitchener and Lord Milner that the republics should merely concede all the demands made by Great Britain regarding the franchise, etc., before the war. The British government, in reply, referred them to the Middle-berg conference as the maximum of possible concessions, and refused permission to the Boers to consult their friends in Europe. They were told it was useless to return to Pretoria without being armed with full yower to negotiate. Mail advices received from Pretoria, continues the Times, declare that Lord Kitchener and Lord Milner promised generous components. Milner promised generous compensa-tion for burned farms, raised no difficulty with regard to the arden of banished leaders, and gave assurances that the question of amnesty for rebels did not present insuperable


