ON A SERIOUS CHARGE.

Young Man Accused of Entering a House in Harwich With Criminal Intent.

A warrant has been issued by Judge Houston, in the county court, for the arrest of William Spencer, of Northwood, Harwich township, on a serious charge of attempted burglary. The information upon which the warrant was issued, was preferred by John Campbell, of Northwood. Recently Mr. Campbell has been away on business in the Northwest and had been expected home for some days. The other night, during the wee small hours, his daughter was awakened by the sound of a man's footsteps in the house. Believing that her father had returned from his trip, she queried, "Is that you, father?"

"No, d— you!" was the gruff response, and as she terrified girl endeavored to escape from the room she was seized by the strong arms of the intruder, and a sponge thrust to her nostrils.

Fortunately the girl's mouth was not covered and she screamed for help. Her cries terrified the would-be burglar and he fled.

Mr. Campbell has sworn out a warrant for Spencer on the charge, but so far the constables have been unable to locate him.

DIED IN MONTANA.

W. O. Smith died at his home, 636 Dakota St., Butte, Mon., on Nov. 7th, and was buried at Mount Moriah Cemetery, on Nov. 9th. The funeral services were conducted by Dr. Blackington, of the Episcopal Church, and by the A. O. U. W. It was the wish of Mr. Smith that he be buried here, otherwise Mrs. Smith would have had the remains shipped to Chatham. It is very likely that Mrs. Smith will return to make her home in Chatham some time before Christmas.

OLD WORLD

Very Latest Cable News.

A Crisis Reported at Hand in China.

GREAT PREPARATIONS FOR ROOM PAUL'S RECEPTION AT PARLISSES—GENERAL CABLE NEWS.

London, Nov. 21.—"At last," says the Shanghai correspondent of the Morning Post, writing yesterday, "the allies in Peking have resolved upon stronger measures to bring matters to a crisis. They have asked the Viceroy of Nankin to state definitely his position toward the Chinese court and the question of forwarding supplies."

"It is credibly reported," says the Shanghai correspondent of the Daily Telegraph, under yesterday's date "that the Empress Dowager has telegraphed a secret decree, warning all governors and viceroys to prepare for immediate war against the allies everywhere."

COMING TO CANADA.

The Duke and Duchess Decide to Visit the Dominion.

London, Nov. 21.—The Duke and Duchess of York, according to the Daily Mail, have definitely decided to visit Canada.

BRITAIN'S BIG GUNS

Must be the Most Effective—Twelve Millions to be Spent on the Artillery.

London, Nov. 21.—Lord Salisbury has decided that the Government must spend £12,000,000 in addition to the cost of the Transvaal war, to bring the British artillery to a higher standard than the German.

PRESIDENT KRUGER.

Preparation for His Reception at Marcellus.

Marseilles, Nov. 31.—Former President Kruger will probably land here on Thursday instead of to-day. Bad weather is reported in the Mediterranean. Every preparation has been made for Kruger's landing. The police and military and the door reception committees are in readiness for his arrival. It is certain that Mr. Kruger's arrival will be the occasion for a great popular demonstration along the route from the dock to his hotel. Mr. Kruger's private secretary, Mr. Eloff, arrived to-day, having left the Gelderland at Port Said, and came on by French steamer. He said he left ex-President Kruger in perfect health and spirits. The former President occupies three bright cabins situated in the stern of the Gelderland. His dining room is decorated with portraits of the Dutch royal family, picture of Queen Wilhelmina having the place of honor. Mr. Kruger declined an offer of the captain's bedroom for his use, preferring a smaller cabin and a lower bunk. Conspicuous on a shelf in Mr. Kruger's sleeping cabin is his famous high hat, with a deep, crape mourning band.

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THE IRISH M. P.'S.

Resolve Not to Attend the Meeting of Parliament Next Month.

Dublin, Nov. 21.—At a meeting of the directors of the United Irish League yesterday, John Redmond presiding, a resolution, calling on the Irish members of Parliament not to attend the House of Commons in December, but to stay at home and make a success of the convention for perfecting the National organization, was unanimously adopted.

STOLE DIAMOND.

To Give to an Actress With Whom he was Infatuated.

Indianapolis, Ind., Nov. 21.—Walton H. Mapes, a young chemist of this city, belonging to a first family, was arrested in Grand Rapids, Mich., for the theft of \$450 in diamonds from Mrs. John Ross, a patient in Sterne's sanitarium, where Mapes was employed. Mapes went to Grand Rapids to join Grace Glasier, a young burlesquer with Misco's City Club, with whom he became infatuated in this city several weeks ago. A letter from Mapes to the girl gave the police their clue. Mapes last night asked Mrs. Ross for her diamonds to wear to a Loyal Legion banquet. When she found there was no banquet, she called in detectives. Dr. Smith Mapes, the young man's father, is at death's door from heart disease. His son's disgrace is being hid from him. His mother is prostrated.

SHOT THE BARTENDER

Serious Affray in a Port Huron, Mich., Saloon.

Port Huron, Mich., Nov. 21.—Harry Ewer, bartender for his brother-in-law, Frank Finn, was shot in the groin by William Langston, a shipbuilder, at Finn's saloon. Langston was intoxicated at the time, and Ewer and he had several drinks in Finn's saloon, when Ewer endeavored to get Langston to go to bed. The latter objected, and when Ewer walked away from him, he pulled a revolver and shot twice. One bullet hit the floor and the other lodged in Ewer's groin. Langston ran out of the saloon, threw the revolver away, and was arrested by Officer Collins. Ewer was cool and walked to a drug store, where the bullet was extracted. Gordon Secor, assistant bartender, was an eyewitness, and came near being shot. Langston told the officer that he shot Ewer because he was called vile names. Langston's father lives in Detroit. He has been employed on a new boat at Jenk's shipyard. Ewer is a son of John Ewer, who was mysteriously killed in Detroit several years ago.
