## WEANING PIGS.

How to Bridge Over the Critical Period in Swine Life.

The critical period in a pig's life is when it is deprived of the mother's milk, says Theodore Louis in Farm, Stock and Home, and how to furnish a substitute for it is a problem often difficult to solve. It is reasonable to say that the growth of pigs while nursing is vigorous, healthy, well fed sow and the uniform development of flesh, muscle and bone can scarcely be maintained when nature's food is withdrawn. But every observing feeder knows that pigs receive their milk warm and often and that their digestive powers are never overtaxed, and it is failure to observe this that often makes the weaning period an "unlucky" one.

It is good economy to feed the sow freely during the nursing period, even if it does seem wasteful to feed so much for the little milk she gives. But it must be remembered that it is the whole litter that is being fed, and when they are 4 or 5 weeks old they need a deal of it. But the feed must be of a quality and quantity that will not cause derangement of the bowels of the little ones. Such things are better prevented than cured. Feed three times a day at regular hours and just enough, having none left in the trough and yet have the appetite satisfied. This requires observation, but it is necessary to success. Where Tom feeds today, Dick tomorrow and Harry the next day, neither knowing nor caring about quantity, pig feeding is a lottery, and blanks are often drawn.

Most every farm has a surplus of milk, and too often it is thought that this alone will substitute sow's milk, and it would to some degree if fed sweet, but this is next to impossible. If milk is dumped into some old will barrel that is never scalded out and the receptacle of kitchen off, vinegar, soap, decayed vegetables and other things too numerous to mention, it is a dangerous substitute for mother's milk. While pigs may become accustomed to sour milk, there is a wide variance in its acidity, and the extreme sourness should be avoided.

Nor should milk in any form be fed to youngsters in undue proportions. Shorts and cornmeal in equal parts should be mixed with it into a thick slop, or the corn may be shelled and soaked and fed by being scattered on a clean floor.

Of course where good pasture is at hand less grain is required, but no greater mistake can be made than to stint pigs by depending entirely on pasture, for the first hundred pounds of growth costs the least. Ever bear in mind that when the pig is not adding to growth and weight every day it is a boarder that fails to pay its bill.

**Do Not Feed Together.**

We never favored the idea of keeping hogs and cattle together at fattening time, for it makes the feed lots so filthy in damp weather to have the hogs rooting and wallowing, says Cyrus Greene in The Prairie Farmer. The cattle sheds and sleeping places in the kept so much dirtier and cleaner if the hogs are shut out, which adds to the comfort of the cattle, and comfort means thrift, and thrift means more profit to the owner. Where there are no hogs to root over and waste the manure there will be more of it at hauling time. For the sanitary condition of the swine we would strongly urge keeping them away from the cattle. When cattle are on full feed of corn, their bowels are in a feverish and loosened condition much of the time, their blood is thick and at a high temperature, many impurities being taken away from the body by the blood and discharged with the excrements, and I never could call that good hog feed. I like pork and sausage, but do not care for them from hogs raised on that kind of feed. When cattle and hogs run together, there are always a few hogs crippled, and occasionally one is killed. This loss is avoided when they are yarded alone. You are probably wondering by this time what you will do with the waste from your cattle, for many think that the waste from the cattle represents the profit. We advise you to take four-sevenths of the amount of grain fed when the cattle and hogs were running together and grind it three-sevenths should be fed to the hogs, grinding a part of it for them for a change. When it is not freezing weather, the corn should be soaked from one feed to the next. Empty all dishes and use fresh water each time. If the dishes sour, put a little salt in the bottom to keep them sweet, as sour hog feed is not healthful. All this may look like "tony" farming. Well, it is, and the pride and abnegation of the American people cause them to be on the constant lookout for more modern and profitable ways of doing things. I have been managing my cattle and hogs in the above way for several years and am suited with it and think if others would try it one season they would not go back to the old way.

**Big Mares.**

The breeding of draft horses of extreme weight is not likely to be overdone in this country for a long time. The fact is there are not any too many mares that can produce the top weight kind. A good, big draft mare is, therefore, worth money to the man who is fixed for raising heavy horses. Breed her to a good, big stallion, feed her and the foal plenty of good growing feed, such as oats, bran and clover hay, with some corn, too, and there is no danger of an undersized colt. Draft blood is something, but not everything. Lack of feed in early life accounts for a whole lot of draft bred horses that are only "chubbs" of 1,400 pounds or less. Undersized nearly always means underfed at some stage of the game.—National Stockman.

## INJUSTICE DONE TO LADY MINTO.

A Montreal Despatch to the New York Journal Arouses Much Indignation.

Ottawa, Jan. 18.—A yellow special from Montreal to the New York Herald is causing needless indignation here. It states that "A movement is on foot among a certain section of the women of Canada which may lead to a social war against Lady Minto, the wife of the Governor-General." The cause of this is alleged to be that instead of furthering Lady Aberdeen's Victorian Order of Nurses, she (Lady Minto) started a hospital on her own account in Winnipeg.

The despatch is not only, of course, incorrect, but is a great injustice to Lady Minto, who, as Ottawans well know, is thoroughly in sympathy with the Victorian Order. As to the statement that Lady Minto is to establish an opposition order of nurses in Manitoba, the story is made out of whole cloth. The cottage hospital mentioned is a station of the Victorian Order, recently established by Miss McLeod, one of the most earnest nurses of the Victorian Order.

**MR. MARSHALL TO MR. MORRISON.**

The Former Disputes the Figures Supplied in the Communication of the Latter.

Editor Planet.—Dear Sir,—Permit me, through your columns, to answer a letter which appeared in The Planet over the signature of J. J. Morrison, and dated Jan. 2nd, 1901, which for false statements and misrepresentation has everything I have read for some time. In this letter he gives in a way that suits himself the amounts that each division is to get in grants in the past two years, which he has expended in the past year. Now Mr. Morrison knows that this is not true and I believe that he knew when he published that letter that it was not true; as he had told him that at least one of the grants which he was counting to their credit was never passed by the council; which was a grant of \$500 to assist in building a bridge over the Teton River, which he had not yet received. I also showed him in the minutes of council the action of the council upon this grant, which should have convinced him. But he would not be convinced until Saturday before the election, when Mr. Hickey saw him and told him that he was wrong. He says Div. No. 6, Raleigh and Dover pay \$600 and give him \$200 to be expended in procuring seed for now in the vicinity of Merlin.

Now, I say the above amounts are wrong, the first a great deal too small; but of course it suited Mr. Morrison's purpose to put them that way. Raleigh and Dover have got in grants of \$200 each, two years over made up as follows:—\$200 for gravel, \$100 to Raleigh Agricultural Society, and between \$200 and \$250 expended by the county in building sidewalks in the township of Dover, from the city limits to the House of Refuge.

Now, in the years '97 and '98, when Mr. Morrison was your commissioner, I cannot find where either Raleigh or Dover got one cent in grants, although there were a lot of grants given. At the June session of '97 we find the following motion on page 37: Moved by Mr. Hickey, seconded by Mr. Morrison, that \$250, heretofore granted to the village of Merlin to build a bridge, be used to purchase gravel for the township between Raleigh and Tilbury East, and that Mr. Morrison and the mover be commissioners to expend the same. Referred to R. and B. Com.

On page 91 of the same session the R. and B. committee make three grants amounting to \$300, Tilbury East and Romney getting the lion's share, \$200 on their towns; but the lion's share got nothing. In fact the only money that came to Raleigh from the county in those years was what Mr. Morrison drew for his services as commissioner and of that as there is no doubt but what we got our share as a comparison of the accounts of Mr. Rankin and Mr. Morrison as passed by the finance committee show the following:—

Mr. Rankin for two years' services on com. mileage \$44.30.  
Mr. Morrison for same \$173.90.

I sincerely thank the electors of Div. No. 6 for the very liberal support given me. Considering the circumstances and the slanders which were heaped upon me, it is almost a wonder that I received any votes at all. Yours truly,

**A DEAD BODY FOUND IN A TRUNK.**

A Ghastly Discovery Made by the Police Officers of New York City.

New York, Jan. 18.—The police found a trunk containing the body of a man in the East River at the foot of Pier 11. The body had been placed in the trunk face down, and the coat and shirt on it were covered with blood. The trunk was green and had no marks on it.

The body was identified by a woman as that of Michael Weisberger, of this city.

Neither the table-cover nor the trunk was the victim's property. It has been ascertained that he left the place where he was employed at 8 o'clock yesterday morning, and was seen alive at noon. He had two hundred dollars' worth of jewelry with him at the time. He was a married man, and had a large family.

**THE BARBER SCORES UPON THE BABY.**

A Sensational Abduction Case Under Police Investigation at Berlin.

Berlin, Ont., Jan. 16.—Berlin has an abduction case exciting its residents at present, a three-year-old son of Mrs. Catherine Ebel, being carried away by a man at noon on Tuesday, who secured the boy under the excuse that he wanted to secure a photograph of the child. Mrs. Ebel has been living in Berlin for some years with her husband, who is now in Detroit, and for which place she intended to leave with the child within a day or two. There are as yet no traces indicating the whereabouts of the child, although many theories are advanced. A young man named Wm. Ahl, a cripple, who has been in Berlin seven years, was arrested by Constable Huber on Tuesday, charged with the abduction, and is in jail on remand until January 24th. He boarded at the same place as Mrs. Ebel. Another young man, a barber, named Julius Neufisher, quite intimate with Ahl, left town on Tuesday afternoon, and has not been seen since. It is supposed that he took the child away, and that Neufisher, by his having photographs of him circulated so as to assist the authorities in their search. It was reported that Neufisher had gone to Doon, and Chief Wetherill visited that place to-day, but found no trace of the young man.
