FRENCH ARE REPULSED

Moorish Troops Equipped With Field Guns Attack Camp

Paris, Oct. 23.—A despatch received from Admiral Philibert, the French naval commander in Moroccan waters, said the 5,000 Moors who attacked the French reconnoitering party recently belonged to the army under the command of Mulai Rachid. Rachid did his utmost to prevent this attack, but his men could not be controlled. Gen. Drude, who came to the rescue, pursued the aggressors for four miles and inflicted severe losses upon them. Col. Defretay, the commander of the reconnoitering party, is held partly responsible for the incident; he had gone beyond the limit of operations fixed in his instructions. The colonel has been placed under arrest for a period of thirty days.

Tangier, Oct. 23.—According to semi-official information received at the Spanish legation yesterday the French forces at Casablanca, under the command of Gen. Drude, suffered a serious repulse Monday at the hands of the Moors.

Moorish troops, estimated at 7,000, and equipped with field guns and modern rifles, not only drove the French back to the city walls, but menaced the town to the extent that the French authorities found it expedient to request aid from a Spanish warship in the harbor to repel the attack.

NEW CORN

New corn in the ear made its first appearance on the market Monday, and opened out at 50 cents per bushel. The corn is of a good quality, and farmers state that the crop is a very fair one.

BEER GOES UP

The chances are that whiskey, beer and ales will take quite an advance in price from now on. The local dealers will probably hold a meeting in the near future to decide on what advances shall be made on the price of these liquid articles.

The cause of this advance is the recent notices sent out by the brewing and distilling companies, who claim that the price of raw materials, such as malt, etc., has advanced, and they are forced to increase their prices to retailers.

All bottled beers and ales will probably cost 15 cents each from now on plus the price of the bottles. Sealed whiskey in bottles will cost 15 cents per glass, and all other intoxicants will take a like advance.

EXPLOSION AT TRENTON

Large Steel Retort Flew into Pieces in Canning Factory

Trenton, Oct. 23.—A fatal accident occurred about 10 o'clock yesterday morning in the Trenton factory of the Canadian Canners' Corporation, in which George Graham was instantly killed and Louis Dube injured so that he died half an hour afterwards.

One of the large steel retorts used for cooking exploded, throwing Graham about 30 feet. Canned foods were blown 400 feet out through the building.

As there were a large number of men and women at work at the time, it is marvelous that other escaped. Graham, a man about 43 years of age, had charge of the retorts, and his helper, Louis Dube, was a man about 55 years of age. They were in front of the retort when it blew up. Pieces of the iron door about 3 x 3 feet square and less than an inch thick, together with the contents of the retort, 280 cans of pumpkin, and the pans in which they were cooking in the retort, all flew in the direction of the two unfortunate men.

Graham was instantly killed. When found he was a terrible sight. His head was in a pool of blood and was badly cut, some bones were broken, he was badly scalded, and his clothing was nearly torn from his body.

Dube was blown in another direction some 30 feet into a doorway. He was still alive, although unconscious, but died from his awful injuries about an hour later. Besides being badly cut and severely scalded, he had a leg broken. Both men were old and respected citizens of Trenton.

The retort that exploded was just on the outside of the main building. Next to it, on the inside, was another retort. The mortar was blown into the building, where two men and six women and girls were working.

Within two or three feet of where the inside heavy iron retort landed, William Hieson and Richard Bryer were washing pumpkins, and one by a table cutting up the pumpkins ready for cooking. Two of them were sitting at the end of the table sorting the seeds, and they barely escaped being hit. As soon as the explosion occurred they all rushed in the opposite direction, and in doing so probably escaped being badly scalded, as the escaping steam was terrible for a few minutes. Fortunately the engineer, shut off all the steam at the engine-house.

Mr. Thomas Flynn, the superintendent at the factory, said that he could not account for the explosion. George Graham, he said, understood his work and was very careful. On a former occasion Graham had worked under him at another factory, and there a defective door on a retort he was attempting to had burst, but had caused no damage. This, however, had made Graham unusually cautious not to allow the steam to get too high. Something must have gone wrong with the safety valve, but if this was known to the two deceased men it was unknown to any one else, and they are not living to

This afternoon that the injured man passed away a short time after the accident. All efforts on the part of the physicians to save his life were of no avail, and the deceased passed away before he could be removed.

The surgeons in attendance are of the opinion that death was possibly caused by injuries to the spinal column or a bad fracture of the skull. The deceased was about 73 years of age. He regained consciousness a few minutes before he died.

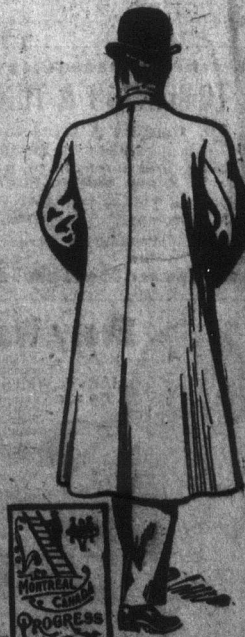
